PROFITABLE PIGS.

The Kind of Management Which is Sure to Give Good Results. Knowing that many a fine litter of pigs is ruined by careless management of the feeder, I take this opportunity to call attention to a few important facts. First, it is necessary to keep the sows in good thrift before the pigs come. This insures good, stout, healthy pigs to begin with. Many are afraid they will get the sow too fat. There is little danger of this, although it is best to feed her milk, bran, shorts and the like, rather than too much corn. Plenty of good bone and flesh-forming food is what is needed, always allowing her to have plenty of exercise in open field.

When the pigs are farrowed feed the sow sparingly of such food as milk, bran, shorts, etc., for the first four or five days, then gradually increase the feed until you give her all she can and will eat clean three times per day. If the sow has a large litter they will get sufficient milk to keep them doing their best. After they are about ten days old place a trough where the pigs can run through the fence and eat by themselves. Feed them sweet milk at first, with a little wheat shorts in it. A little later on, feed also a little corn, but principally feed them on bone and muscle-forming food. Give them all they will eat.

When they are six weeks old decrease the feed of the sow gradually, so her milk flow will gradually decrease. When the pigs are eight weeks old wean them off. Give them all they will eat and allow them plenty of fresh clover grass if possible, and they will make hogs that you will never be ashamed to place on any market, and they will pay you for doing your work well. It don't pay to half-way do anything. If anything will pay at all it will pay to do it well. Whatever your hand findeth to do, do it with your might, with all the care and judgment you can possibly bestow. —J. A. Hall, in Ohio Farmer.

AIR AND EXERCISE.

They Materially Affect the Meat of Sheep, Cattle and Poultry.

The meat of certain animals—sheep, cattle and poultry—is preferred to, commands a higher price and is in greater demand in the English market than the meat of other animals. For the mutton of Welsh mountain sheep, and of the Southdowns and Cheviots, all subsisting on short and scant feed, regularly brings from two to three cents per pound more than much larger and fatter mutton; the practical reason being the greater value of the mutton, because the sheep supplying it are more active, performing their excretory breathing functions more fully and so producing a pure, healthier and better flavored quality of meat. The same is true of the Kylee and other active cattle of Scotland, and the Devon and other active cattle of England. Their flesh is better flavored from their better quality of blood, which results from greater activity, so that the juicy, sweet meat of active cattle generally sells at from two to four cents per pound higher in price than that of inactive cattle. In poultry the same distinction holds; the active, lively breeds, usually smaller in size, supply the healthiest and best quality of poultry meat. The same is true of wild fowl and deer, the best quality of meat being obtained from those varieties or breeds that are regularly the most active in getting subsistence, whether on the wing, or like ducks and geese, in the water, or on foot.—Farmer's Voice.

A MARKED ADVANCE.

Average Country Road Better Now Than It Was a Few Years Ago.

At a recent public meeting not far from here a good dominie, rising to speak, prefaced his remarks by saying that there ought to be added to the litany an appeal like this: "From lumbago and newly worked roads, good Lord, deliver us." Riding over the country at this season of the year the wayfarer may well join the brother in this earnest petition; and if power could be given to the horse to speak as did that patient animal of sacred history in Balaam's time such a chorus would arise as would disturb the dreams of the would-be legislators who play with the question of good roads at our state capitals every winter, and arouse them to a better sense of their duty in this respect than seems to have impressed itself upon them as yet.

Still, it is a far cry from the old way of working the roads with the plows and old-fashioned scraper to the modern well-made road machine. Save in some of the districts where men still declare that there is no true way to improve the roads except to turn up the mud and stones along the side and haul them into the track with a scraper, there certainly has been a marked advance within the last few years. It is true we have not yet learned to use the road machine as it should be used. Its capabilities are not at present fully understood by all. A first-class machine in the hands of a good man will certainly make a good road. It is not all of roadmaking, however, to haul dirt, cloas and stones into the highway. The machine must be followed up closely by men with rakes to remove all loose stones, and they by teams to draw all these away. When thus made smooth, if the pike be made wide enough, the result will be a much better road.
