PROPITABLE PIGS.

to Give Good Results. the like, rather than too much corn. Plenty of good bone and flesh-forming food is what is needed, always allowing her to have plenty of exercise in open

When the pigs are farrowed feed the sow sparingly of such food as milk, bran, shorts, etc., for the first four or five days, then gradually increase the feed until you give ber all she can and will eat clean three times per day. If the sow has a large litter they will get sufficient milk to keep them doing their best. After they are about ten daysold place a trough where the pige can run through the fence and eat by them-selves. Feed them sweet milk at first, with a little wheat shorts in it. A little later on, feed also a little corn, but principally feed them on bone and muscleforming food Give them all they will

When they are six weeks old decrease the feed of the sow gradually, so her milk flow will gradually decrease. When the pige are eight weeks old wean them off. Give them all they will eat and allow them plenty of fresh clover grass if possible, and they will make hogs that you will never be ashamed to place on doing your work well. It don't pay to half-way do anything. If anything will pay at all it will pay to do it well. Whatsoever your hand findeth to do. do it with your might, with all the care and judgment you can possibly bestow.


