GLITTERS LIKE A STAR.

THE "ELI'S NEW EQUIPMENT." Description of the Magnificent New Cars that Make Up the Burlington's Fast Train Between St. Joseph, Kansas City and Chicago. The train is a marvel of the car builders art, and embodies many novel ideas. Besides being new from end to end it is striking in appearance because of the rich canary color of its cars. Another striking point, says the Chicago Inter-Ocean, is the absence of platforms on the baggage car; a novelty in car construction, which very much improves the appearance of the train. The vestibules are of that generous width, flush with the outside of the cars, heretofore only seen on a limited of the later Pullman cars. In connection with this platform the Burlington has adopted a very ingenious device, invented and patented by William A. Forsyth, master mechanic at Aurora, by means of which the vestibule doors are opened and the steps lowered with ease. The smoking car is a great improvement over those ordinarily in use, being fitted with reclining chair seats, upholstered in leather. The chair cars are beautifully finished in highly polished mahogany. They are upholstered in luxurious silk velvet plush, and the aisles are covered with rich moquette carpet. Of the Pullman sleeping cars much might be said, but when it is stated that they are of the latest Pullman pattern, with arched roofs, wide vestibules, and the richest finish in wood and upholstery the experienced traveler has the picture in mind at once. The train is lighted with gas, is heated with hot water and leaves St. Joseph at 6:45 p. m. daily, reaching Chicago at 9:35 the following morning.
