THE CHIEF

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WASHINGTON NOTES.

Speaker Reed is the man who controls the fate of the senate resolution declaring for the recognition of Cuban belligerency, and their is no reason for anybody entertaining any doubt as to his attitude towards that resolution. If President McKinley should conclude that a recognition of belligerency would be preferable to the policy he has mapped out for himself and should desire to have that resolution adopted by the house, he has only to say so and Speaker Reed will promptly put the resolution through, but so long as the President remains of the opinion that a recognition of belligerency will not satisfactorily meet the exigencies of the case, that resolution will remain just where it is—on the speaker's table. There is much talk about a revolt on the part of the house, and the adoption of that resolution in spite of the speaker, but is only talk. Enough republicans in the house will stand by the speaker and the president to control that body, and that, too, in the face of the fact that probably seven-tenths of them are in favor of the belligerency resolution. No such thing as a "vote of confidence" is known in American legislative proceedings, but President McKinley in saying that the adoption of that resolution at this time would embarrass him in carrying out his Cuban policy, has practically asked his party in the house for a vote of confidence, and, although there is no politics in this question, his party is likely to do as he wishes, at least long enough for him to have the chance to make his policy known.

If the republican and democratic senators live up to their caucus agreements, the country will be spared long winded speeches in the tariff debate which was opened today by Senator Aldrich. The republicans did not attempt to have their caucus endorse the amendments to the tariff bill, because it would have been useless, owing to outspoken opposition to some of the schedules on the part of republican senators. The democrats decided to start in by making an attempt to strike out all the internal revenue taxes imposed by the bill, leaving their future actions to be determined by the discussions they expect to see developed among the republicans. The populist senators are not talking much about their intentions, but it is safe to say that they will in all the preliminary voting, stand for or against those items in the bill which they think are for or against the interests of their states, reserving the right to vote for or against the entire bill when it is put upon its final passage. It is now thought that the bill will be passed by the senate inside of four weeks, unless, it shall be delayed by some complications now unexpected.

Senator Gorman and Representative Richardson, of Tenn., have always enjoyed the reputation of being hustlers in getting places for their constituents, but it fairly made the eyes of some of their colleagues bulge when it was stated before the senate civil service committee that when Mr. Gorman was chairman of the senate printing committee, and Mr. Richardson of the house printing committee, they had to their credit two hundred and seventy-five employes respectively in the government printing office. A great many of these employes are still there, enjoying whatever protection there may be. Mr. Cleveland's extension of the civil service rules, against which such a fight is being made by republicans.

The politicians are much interested in the succession of the late Senator Earle, of S. C., who died last week.

The legislature of the state will not meet until next January, so the naming of the senator who will serve until that time, belongs to Gov. Ellerbe, who is himself credited with senatorial aspirations. It is thought that Senator Tillman would like very much to have his friend, Ex-Gov. Evans, appointed to the vacancy, but, according to South Carolinians in Washington, Gov. Ellerbe is not on sufficiently good terms with Mr. Tillman to care about obliging him.

Assistant Secretary Roosevelt, has apparently given up the habit of carrying official dynamite around in his pocket. He has investigated the complaints made against the management of two Navy Yards and has reported that he found very little basis for them as a rule.

The interstate commerce commission doesn't like the railroad pooling bill, pending in the senate, and has submitted its objections in writing. The commission tells congress plainly that if it intends to take away the authority of the commission, it should do so in a straightforward manner, in order that plain people may know just what is being done.
