THE CHIEF

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WASHINGTON NOTES.

Write a number of senators think with the late General Hancock, that the tariff is a local issue, and, what is more important, are voting that way, as the schedules are reached containing protective duties upon products of their states. The most notable instances of this during the past week were the Georgia senators—Bacon and Clay—who both supported the tariff on lumber, notwithstanding the appeals of such leaders of the party as Senators Jones, Ark., and Vest of Mo., to keep lumber on the free list. Senator Bacon qualified his support by saying that he was not a protectionist, but that the stern necessities of the government required a tariff, and a high tariff; but his colleague, Senator Clay, in what was his maiden speech, declared himself emphatically against free trade and in favor of a tariff sufficient to carry on the government economically administered, and of the strictest equality in levying this tariff. Of course neither gentleman said anything about Georgia being a large lumber-producing state.

There is still more less grumbling about the tariff bill not being disposed of fast enough by the senate, but as a matter of fact, it is doubtful whether there is a single senator who is not surprised at the progress made on the bill. All recent tariff records in the senate have already been broken, and no disposition has been shown in any quarter to delay any of the schedules by useless discussion, and the senators are living up to the agreements not to make long speeches. If this state of affairs continues the bill will in all likelihood become a law before the 15th of July. It will depend, however, largely upon the sugar schedule. The senate sugar schedule is regarded as dead, and there are some ugly reports about the intention of the sugar trust to use its powerful influence to hang the bill up as long as possible, if the house schedule is put back.

Maj. W. D. Smith, an American who is an officer under General Gomez, in Cuba, has been giving the senate committee on foreign relations the benefit of his personal experience. The committee heard Maj. Smith in secret session and his testimony will not be printed. A bit of what he said may be found in the following remarks made by him outside of the committee room: "All talk about autonomy and of Spanish reforms for Cuba is so much breath wasted. Not a man in the Cuban army will agree to accept anything short of absolute independence. The Cuban army is now in better condition to resist the Spaniards and to maintain the fight for independence than it has been since the beginning of the war. Gen. Gomez has a well-disciplined army of about 40,000 men, who are determined to hold out until their efforts are crowned with victory. Our soldiers are rapidly procuring arms and every day serves to put them on a better footing."

The senate committee on civil service reform, to which was referred Senator Gallinger's amendment to the general deficiency appropriation bill, exempting laborers from the civil service rules, has unanimously reported the following amendment to the bill: "No laborer of any class employed by the government shall be included in the classified executive civil service, and all civil service rules heretofore promulgated with respect to this class of employees are hereby abrogated." There is no doubt of the acceptance of this amendment. Senator Pritchard, chairman of this committee says this amendment is as far as the committee

has determined, but that other exemptions will probably be recommended.

The administration is preparing for its first wrestle with the courts in an effort to enforce the Sherman anti-trust law, which the last administration declared to be worthless. The attorney general has ordered that suit be brought against the Traders Live Stock Exchange of Kansas City, Mo., in the U. S. circuit court, for violation of the Sherman law, by having boycotted commission merchants who sold stock to traders who did not belong to the exchange.

Senator Butler's short speech in favor of legislation that will impose an income tax consisted largely of a notice served upon the senators who have been working for the bill legalizing railroad pooling, then, if he could prevent it, no pooling bill should be voted upon by the senate until after an income tax had been voted upon.

Senator Pettigrew wants legislation that will submit two questions to a popular vote at the congressional election of 1898. He wants the people to vote yes or no on the questions of whether this government shall adopt the free coinage of silver and whether senators shall be elected by direct vote.

When the head of a foreign nation objects to receiving the man nominated by the president and confirmed by the senate to represent the U. S. as ambassador or minister to that nation, he is merely exercising a prerogative that is recognized by all nations, and the minister has nothing left but to resign. Although it is denied at the state department that any official notice of objection has been received by this government from Turkey, it looks as though Hon. James B. Angell, late president of the university of Michigan, would be a victim of the persona non grata hoodoo. It is admitted by officials that they have knowledge of an attempt to poison the mind of the Sultan against Mr. Angell on account of his prominence as an advocate of the christian religion, but they say that statements have been made which will satisfy the Sultan and that Mr. Angell will, within two weeks, start for Turkey. He may, but the impression in Washington is, that he will not.

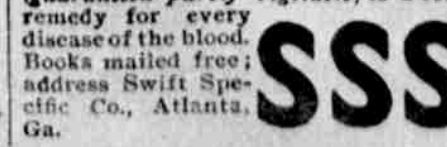
