#### Obituary.

Susan De Fisher died at her home on Indian creek, June 8th, 1897, aged 43 years, 8 months and 20 days.

The deceased was born in Rain-bridge, Putnam county, Indiana, September 19th, 1854, and moved to Glenwood, Iowa, in 1896. At the age of nineteen she united with the Baptist church at that place and on coming to this county in '73 she united with the Baptist church at Red Cloud. She was a consistent member and christian to the time of her death, a great lover of the house of God and when possible was always found there.


During her last sickness she manifested great patience. She said she was willing, ready and sometimes almost anxious to be at rest and told weeping friends not to weep and mourn for her for she was ready to live if it was God's will and just as ready to go whenever He called for her, and to her friends who came in she said: "Our meeting and parting is almost over, but I am ready to go and I want to meet you all in heaven."

A great many times during her last illness, although a person who never sang, she sang, "Jesus Lover of My Soul," often repeating, "Other Refuge Have I None," two or three times.

Her pastor being absent her funeral was preached at her home by Rev. Blackwell, from two of her favorite texts found in Rev. 14:13—"Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth; Yea saith the Spirit they rest from their labors and their works do follow them," also Matt. 24:44—"Therefore be ye also ready for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh." After which her remains were conveyed to the Indian creek graveyard followed by a large concourse of relatives and friends.
