

REV. HENRY G. PERRY, LL. D.

AFTERNOON.

The afternoon will be devoted almost entirely to sports. Program as follows:

Music by S. of V. band at 2 o'clock. Bowery dance. Bicycle races.

Hose race open to any company. Coupling contest. Grand water fight. First prize \$10; second prize \$5.

Fat man's race—must weigh two hundred pounds and be 35 years old. First \$2.50; second \$1.50.

Boys race, to be not less than one hundred yards. First prize \$3.50; second \$1.50.

Catching greased pig—catcher gets pig. Climbing greased pole—\$2.50 on top of pole.

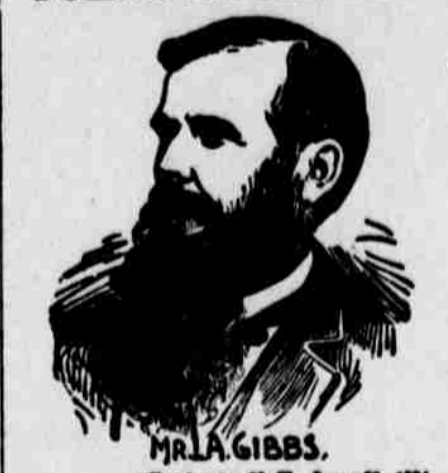
