Fugitive Captured.

Late Saturday night Sheriff Runchey returned home from a trip to Broken Bow, having in his custody "Old Jack Riddle" alias James Jones, one of the robbers who escaped at the river bridge on the morning of Sunday, May 17th, the particulars of which escape were told in the columns of THE CHIEF at the time. Sheriff Runchey since that time has been alert and left no stone unturned that would lead to a clue of the whereabouts and the capture of the fugitives. On Wednesday of last week he received a letter from T. A. Leasure, sheriff of Custer county stating that a man bearing a good resemblance to the description and photograph of one of the men had been seen in that vicinity. The sheriff took the first train out for that point. On arriving it was learned that the man wanted was supposed to be in hiding at the home of a brother-in-law up among the sand hills and canyons, about twenty-three miles from Broken Bow. Accompanied by Sheriff Leasure and several other parties who volunteered their services, Sheriff Runchey started for the fugitive's hiding place. It was indeed a unique place to take refuge in as the house could only be reached by traveling through deep canyons running out in all directions. A means of escape had been provided the fugitive by his brother-in-law in the shape of a horse saddled and bridled which he stated to the searchers his boy was going to ride to some other place in the county. The horse was immediately unsaddled and taken back to the barn but was again turned loose by some one on the premises but it was again taken up by the sheriff and his men. A careful search was then made and the fugitive was found in the barn and concluded to give up without resistance. Deputy Sheriff Reigle received a telegram that the man had been captured and to come to Hastings with a team which he did Friday night, being accompanied by Randolph McNitt. The preliminary of the man was held before Judge Duffy on Monday and he was bound over to district court in default of a \$1,000 bond.
