after the matter. Most everything in the building was lost except some baggage, but as there was very little freight in the freight house the damage here was small. One freight caristanding on the house track was consumed, but luckily it was empty. The advertising car of Ringling Bros shows, which was on the track near the building, was pushed by the employes to a safe distance.

After the first fire had been practically out for an hour or two an alarm was again turned in and it was discovered that a house belonging to Fred Peterson and occupied by Jack Lantz was in flames. This house stood over a block from the first fire and there is considerable question as to its origin. The household goods were all saved.
