One of the Most Successful Meetings Ever Held in the History of the Red Cloud Lodge.

The A. O. U. W. lodge, No. 60, of this city east their mantle of protection over thirty new homes to the amount of \$60,000 at their regular meeting on last Tuesday evening. The meeting was one of the largest, if not the largest, in the history of the Red Cloud lodge. Hon. O. J. VanDyke, deputy grand master workman was present, and remarked that this was the largest number taken into an old lodge at one time, in the state, for the last eleven years at least.

The Depot Burned.

Last night the B. & M. depot at this place went up in smoke and all that is left is a charred heap of debris. The fire was discovered between one and two o'clock and an alarm was turned in immediately. The fire department went immediately to the scene of the conflagration, and although they worked with a will, the building was too far gone and the water pressure too weak to make their efforts effective.

Most everything in the building was lost except some baggage, but as there was very little freight in the freight house the damage here was small. One freight car standing on the house track was consumed, but luckily it was empty. After the first fire had been practically out for an hour or two an alarm was again turned in and it was discovered that a house belonging to Fred Peterson and occupied by Jack Lantz was in flames.
