BOX RENTS.—The rates charged for boxes is always fixed by the department. No box shall be assigned to the use of any person until the rent thereof shall be paid one quarter in advance. Any person renting a box is entitled to have only the mail for his family put into it. Each box must be restricted to the use of one family, firm, or corporation. In every case the postmaster shall give a receipt for money received for box rent.
