WASHINGTON NOTES

The monetary commission resumed its sittings in Washington today, after a recess of two weeks. The gentlemen composing this commission believe that there is going to be a big financial fight started in congress soon after that body assembles, although many shrewd politicians among the politicians are working to prevent the financial issue being raised in congress, because of their doubt as to whether any legislation of that character can be put through during the life of the present congress, and fearing that a sharp drawing of financial lines in congress will result in harm to the republicans. One of the main objects of the monetary commission is to insist that there shall be an attempt at financial legislation at the coming session of congress and that the attempt shall be recommended by President McKinley and be pushed by the whole power and influence of the administration. The lines are already being mapped out, and the prediction has been made that the financial fight in congress will be the bitterest and most exciting since the Force bill was before congress. The fighting will be mostly in the sen. ate, as it will be an easy matter to put any bill supported by the president and Speaker Reed through the house. It is assumed that any bill proposed by those who are pushing this movement will be antagonized by the silver men in the senate, and as they control that body by a slight margin it requies no prophet to say that it will be difficult, if not impossible, to pass any such measure in the senate.

JEROME VANCE The new ballot contains the complete ticket nominated by each party side by side instead of grouping the candidates for each office, and each ticket is headed by the appropriate party emblem, and the duty of the straight party voter is simple and easily performed without possibility of mistake. He has simply to place a cross within the circle at the top of the ticket indicated by his party emblem. But the opportunity offered the independent voter seems not so obvious to a great many people, and it is important that independent voters be informed since that element has come to be a dominant power in our politics. We suggest that every such voter, and every voter in fact, ascertain before he goes to the polling places just how he can accurately express his voting intention upon the ballot. As we read the law the voter who desires to vote for a majority of the nominees upon one party ticket and for a minority of nominees upon another or other party tickets, he may place his mark at the head of the ticket for which he wishes to vote generally, and then place an X in the space opposite the several candidates upon other tickets for whom he wishes to vote. If the voter does not desire to signify his choice of a party upon the ballot he may place an X in the space opposite the name of each candidate for whom he wishes to vote regardless of the party ticket upon which the name appears, and this is true as to groups of candidates as well as to single names. It will pay independent as well as straight voters to study the new law carefully.
