The whole 10,000 acres have averaged three cuttings this year, and have yielded six tons to the acre. In the county 8,000 head of cattle were fed last year. The number is being greatly increased for this winter, while twice as many hogs will be fattened. These alfalfa farmers claim as much for the product as hog food as they do for fattening cattle. They feed it both green and cured. Some of them prefer it to corn.—Corn Belt.
