BISMARCK, N. D., Nov. 16.-Alex Coudot, Paul Holy Track and Philip Ireland, Indians, the first of whom was sentenced to death for the murder fessed accessories in the murder, were taken from the jail in Emmons county Saturday night and lynched by a mob. The lynching apparently had been cooly planned and was carried out without a break in the program. Sudden and swift retribution was meted out by the mob to the murderers.

Williamsport, where the hanging took place, is about forty miles from tals city and off the railroad. The news of the hanging was received here yesterday afternoon, when a mounted messenger arrived, his horse point about 800 feet below the surface. in a foam from a swift ride, and announced that the three men had been lynched. The sheriff of the county, Peter Shier, was in this city at the time the hanging occurred and it was to him that the messenger rode in such hot haste. The men had been under the custody of Deputy Sheriff Tom Kelley, and they were taken from under his control by the mob and hanged to a beef windlass several hundred yards from the jail, where their bodies swung to the breeze during the entire day, the coroner being late to arrive and no one else volunteering to cut them down.

Was Accused of Crime OLATHE, Kan., Nov. 16. - J. F. Herman, for more than fifteen years an attorney of this city, who was to have been tried in Lawrence to-day on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, killed himself by taking carbolic acid about 5 o'clock this morning.

Herman came from Carlisle. Pa., over fifteen years ago and about ten years ago he was married to Miss Kate Scallon, a teacher at the institution for the deaf and dumb here. He was until recently a Sunday school superintendent. During the years he was an enthusiastic Sunday school worker he played poker unknown to his church and family. Its feature is the strong advocacy of postal savings depositories as a scheme over which Postmaster General Gary has worked several months in the formulation of plans to present to the president and congress. He says the time is ripe for the establishment, and that the addition of a well organized system would confer a great boon upon a large number of people, and ultimately be of inestimable ben-efit to the whole country. Two Missouri Farmers Strung Up Work of Masked Men.

LAMAR, Mo., Nov. 17. -Last night Sheriff Livingston and Marshal Rice went to Boston, six miles south, and arrested Bill Simpson and Bill Catterly, farmers, each aged about 40, on the charge of having criminally assaulted Mrs. Jacob S. Resh and thrown carbolle acid into her face last Thursday evening.

On the road to the jall here the officers were stopped by an armed mob and the prisonors taken and hanged to a tree until they were almost dead. When they were cut down they confessed the crime, implicating Henry Avery, a young farmer, and Dave Mongstar of Carthage.

After the confession the prisoners were returned to the officers with instructions to take them to fail. Excitement is high near Boston and the prisoners may yet be taken from jail and hanged.

MUST READ ENGLISH

Wroming Supreme Court Decides an

Important Suffrage Question. CHEYENNE, Wo., Nov. 17. -The Wyoming supreme court yesterday rendered a decision in the Carbon county election case sustaining the contencandidates for county attorney, treasurer and commissioner on the Democratic ticket at the last election. The court decided that foreign born citizens must be required to read the constitution in the English larguage in order to vote. There were 115 Finns who voted the Republican ticket, but could not read the constitution in English. Their votes were accepted, as they could read it in their own language.

The decision will put the Democratic candidates in office and settle a very important constitutional question.

STOCK GROWERS TO MEET.

Convention to Perfect a National Organization Called for January.

DENVER, Col., Nov. 17 .- Under tolay's date George L. Golding and Arthur Williams, respectively chairman and secretary of the executive committee for the National Stock Growers' convention, have issued a call therefor pursuant to the action of a joint committee of the local chamber of commerce and the State Cattle Growers' association. The address is "To the governors, members of the state, territorial and local range cattle, horse, sheep and swine growers' associations, breeders of fine stock in the United States;" the time is set for January 25, 26 and 27, 1894, and the purpose is stated to be to "perfect the organization of a national stock grow eas' association."

HUNG STATE WITNESSES

Cases Against Two Other Spicer Family Murderers Must Be Dismissed.

BISMARCE, N. D., Nov. 17. - An interesting legal question is presented by the lynching of three of the Spicer murderers. Two of the men, Holy Track and Ireland, were the state's witnesses, and without their testimony the state has no case against the wo surviving suspects, Blackhawk and Defender. There is, therefore, now no possibility of convicting them before any tribunal, for the reason that the state's witnesses, self-contessed accomplices of the murderers, are dead. At the coming term of court, when the two men are arraigned for trial, they must be dismissed.
