A reason given privately is that some of the senators who had themselves placed on the doubtful list merely did so to increase their chances for obtaining desired patronage, and that having succeeded they have informed the president of their willingness to vote for annexation. There is still another reason, too. Prominent democrats in various sections of the country have been arguing with the do not purge, pain or gripe. Cellulous, the New Corn Stalk Product. The Kausas City Star recently printed the first full account that has been given to the public of the new industry of making valuable products from dry corn stalks. A factory is in operation in Kentucky and another in Illinois, and plans for eight more have been completed, so that the new industry can no longer be a mere experiment. When the announcement was made some months ago that a great Philadelphia ship building firm was about to embark in this curious industry of separating the pith from the outer covering of corn stalks, the project was looked upon as rather visionary, and most people doubted whether there was any truth in the story. But corn staik cellulous, as the new product is called, is today an article of commerce and the men who control the patents for its manufacture assert that there is practically no limit to the demand for it, and that ultimately the corn stalk product of the eighty million acres of corn in the United States may be utilized.
