GLORY SURPASSING SOLOMON'S

London's Lord Mayor is a Gorgeous Creature When Arrayed in His Robes.

The fountain of municipal honor in England undoubtedly springs from the Guildhall, London, which justly claims to be accounted the most ancient of our municipal halls, seeing that the lord mayors of the last eight centuries are with justice assumed to have had prototypes in the Roman prefect and the Saxon fortryge or portgrave. For a considerable number of years, says the London Telegraph, the robes of the lord mayor, the court of aldermen, and the common councilors have been settled with a precision that none save the most reckless of innovators would presume to disturb.

The lord mayor himself has his "gold" robe for the occasion of the annual Guildhall banquet, and for the times when he proceeds in state either to the new law courts or to the houses of parliament. The aldermen have their scarlet gowns, the sheriffs their distinctive and very handsome robes and chains, while the common councilors rejoice in gowns called "mazarines." It being generally understood that mazarine is a term for a dark blue color, although, according to some lexicographers, mazarine also means a drinking vessel and an old way of dressing fowls. Then, again, when the sovereign comes into the city the lord mayor is bound to don a robe of crimson or purple velvet trimmed with ermine. At the time of his investiture he wears a massive gold chain, but when he is honored by reelection at the expiration of his term of office he wears two chains.

The mace of silver gilt, surmounted by a royal crown and the imperial arms, is carried before the mayor by the authority of the charter of Edward III., while the city possesses no less than four swords—one called the pearl, presented by Queen Bess when she opened the first royal exchange, and so called from its being richly set with pearls. The sword precedes the chief magistrate on all occasions of rejoicing and festivity. The sword of state is carried before the lord mayor as an emblem of his sovereignty within the city proper; the black sword is used on fast days in Lent and at the death of any member of the royal family, while the fourth sword is that placed close to the lord mayor's chair at the central criminal court.

A CLEAR CASE OF BUNCO.

Artifice Adopted Successfully by a Negro Beggar of Panama.

I had just started from the hotel toward the market place, when I noticed an elderly darky, standing on the opposite side of the street, looking from one to another of the people going in and out of the various entrances to the hotel. The moment his eyes caught mine his face lighted up, and with outstretched hand and a smile he came hurrying across the way, says a correspondent of the New York Sun.

"Fo' de Lawd, boss, I've glad to see you. I've been lookin' for you all this mawnin'."

There was no refusing such a cordial greeting. I shook hands and said: "Looking for me? I don't know you. How did you happen to be looking for me?"

"How come I look for you? I've gwine tell you. 'Co'se you don't know me. I've gwine tell you 'bout dat, too. I've been waitin' fo' you because I ain't had er mouthful o' coffee dis blessed mawnin'. I've on de beach an' I'd jess like ter borry a dime."

It was a clear case of Panama bunco, but there was such a happy expression on his face—he so thoroughly enjoyed his little game and he worked it so well—that there was no refusing him. Besides he is the most artistic member of a great gang of peculiar negro beggars to be found on the streets of Panama. They are, without exception, from the islands ruled by the British in the West Indies, and they beg only of English-speaking strangers. On every corner and on several blocks between corners, while walking to the market, I met negro men. Without exception they bowed and touched their hats and said: "Good mawnin', boss. I've on de beach, sah. A dime, sah, if yo' please." "On the beach" is equivalent to the American "on his uppers," or "dead broke."

A Hungarian Court.

The Hungarian prime minister has succeeded in reestablishing a royal court in Buda Pesth. Hitherto, when the emperor of Austria, as king of Hungary, came to visit the capital of Hungary, he took his Austrian household with him. Henceforth the Hungarian lords are to surround him upon all ceremonies in Buda Pesth, and they will also attend him at ceremonies in Vienna, side by side with their Austrian counterparts.

Sympathetic Sounds.

A stringed instrument suspended in a favorable position near a pianoforte will sound when tones corresponding to the open strings are produced on the pianoforte. The volume of the answering tone will depend upon atmospheric conditions, the quality and color of the persuaing tone and the sensitiveness of the responding material. There is a familiar anecdote told of a famous tenor, who by singing the tone that was consonant with that of a wine-glass, could make the glass shiver so violently that it would fall to pieces. It is because of the tonal sympathy that the cause of a harsh, rattling tone that may suddenly appear in a pianoforte is detected with difficulty. Though it may appear to be in the instrument, it is often far away and may come from a loose globe or pendant on a chandelier. Even a key in the door has been known to be the guilty cause.

THE GREYHOUND.

Dogs Used for the Chase by English Sovereigns and Nobles.

Greyhounds have existed in very much the same form as we find them to-day for more than three thousand years, as we find them pictured on Egyptian monuments of that remote period. The name probably came from their general color in England when King Canute decreed that none but princes and nobles should keep them. The color now, in either smooth or rough coated greyhounds, is very seldom grey, but more often fawn, red, brindled (either red and black mixed or fawn and blue), or black.

The smooth coated dog is known as the English greyhound, and the rough coated as the Scotch deerhound. In conformation they are very much the same. They are the fastest runners of any of the canine race. On level ground they can go as fast as a race horse, and over hilly ground they can unquestionably beat even the fleet-footed thoroughbred. Formerly the English dog was used in chasing the red and fallow deer, and it is related that on one occasion Queen Elizabeth witnessed the pulling down of sixteen bucks. The dogs of that day must have been stronger than those now found in England. When the master of the royal buckhounds now has a meet in the royal forests of England it is a sorry sight, for the deer are themselves more than half domesticated, and do not know how to get away.

The greyhound is used, however, in coursing hares, and it is one of the national sports of Great Britain. In Texas and some other parts of America where jack rabbits abound greyhounds are kept to chase them. The English greyhound is a beautiful, graceful and aristocratic looking dog, but the Scotch deerhound is more dignified in appearance. These dogs are trained to hunt game by the eye alone. They have good noses, however, and if permitted to do so will also hunt by scent.

A western judge was approached by a verdant couple who wanted to be married. The would-be bridegroom asked the price of tying the knot, and was told it was a dollar. "Can't you take beeswax?" inquired the rustic. "Yes," said the squire. The wax was brought in, and, upon being weighed, was found to be worth just sixty cents. 
