One of the worst tornadoes ever known in the west visited the city of Ft. Smith, Arkansas, on Wednesday evening about 11 o'clock. The number of dead so far as known exceeds thirty and the wounded will be considerable in excess of that. The storm made a clean sweep of everything in its path, and to add to the terror fire broke out in the ruins. Upward of two score of persons are believed to have perished, and the loss of property will be over a million dollars.

The sacred concert given by the Original Tennesseans at the Methodist church in this city last Sunday evening, drew the largest crowd that has probably ever congregated in that sacred edifice at one time. A careful estimate places the number present at a little over five hundred. No admission fee was charged, a collection being taken up at the door. New England Loan & Trust company vs Henry C. Cutter, et al. For confirmation. Ordered to show cause by Saturday forenoon why sale should not be confirmed.
