From Across the Mountains. OLIVE, Cal., January 20, '98. EDITOR CHIEF—As we have had a rather dry winter vegetation is rather backward for this time of the year. Most small grain is in and some fields are green. There has been some cold weather here this winter the mercury running as low as thirty above. In some exposed orchards the oranges are hurt by frost. Oranges are selling at \$1.15 to \$2.10 per box. The rancher gets 80c per hundred for corn, oats \$1.20, barley 75c, butter 20c, eggs 17c, dried fruits 5c, chickens \$4. Olive is a milling station on the Santa Fe railroad, seven miles north of Santa Ana. We have a school house, church, two stores, postoffice, and some very fine residences. A good hotel that gets most of its patronage from health seekers, for as we are at the base of the foothills the air is much dryer and lighter here than farther down in the valley. George Brown, a former resident of Red Cloud, died at Santa Ana on the 14th of this month, and was buried on the 16th by the Forresters of which he was a member. His death was caused by consumption. He was followed to his last resting place by a large concourse of sorrowing friends as he was considered a model young man. His relatives and friends at Red Cloud may rest assured that he was well cared for in his sickness and his body now lies under a perfect bed of flowers. The funeral was preached by Rev.
