He cannot move towards you; you cannot fly to him. There is a great hollow aching within. Night now falls and there he still lies; sight gone, comeliness gone, life gone, with none to cover his horrors from the cold glitter of the stars and none to drive from him the ghouls who make sport of life by robbing the dead. With a shudder you think of the chill enshrouding mist and the gloom of in splendid order for us to get a crop. that dreadful night. With a deeper shudder you think of the heat festering of the pittiless sun as it rises to summon to their vile duty the buzzard and you when the triumph comes and the blind populace who have not suffered, think only of the living but have no feeling for your dead? Yet they are aiming, firing, maiming, killing in a perfect frenzy of subordinated will. Beyond all this, they grow so wild with the horrible gloating and glut of bloodshed that death alone is not enough for the dead enemy, but he needs must be outraged, insulted mocked when he is dead. Yet all this is spoken of as glory; it is made so by drawing a cloak over its horror; and by being heedless of the dead and heedful only of the survivors. It is the theme of the descriptive writer, a source of profit to the contractors, and a summons to insensate rejoicing on the part of all those human parasites who will gladly reap from others sorrows where they themselves have neither sown nor know of sorrow or of loss.

You men who at every corner talk of war; who feel utterly capable of the successful conduct of a campaign; but yet have not even the remotest intention of moving away from your cosy firesides, examine yourselves and purge yourselves from confusion of thought. It is well to think twice before speaking once in favor of slaughter. The second thought will show that where there is no intention, no ability, no fitness for combat it is essentially selfish to urge it when others shall bear its burdens, leaving to the home-stayers only the results. Many of you will rejoice if war is declared. You will read with avidity news about your fellows going to their death, and then in the fluctuating values of the stock market, you will see chances to make money out of misery, and straightway go and do it. You will pile up wealth while somebody's son gives up life to leave you undisturbed in scraping profits out of cowardly quiet. But if you who foment the war feeling by quiet chattirg, are worthy of blame, what shall be said of our New York perveyors of news-rather, perverters of news-who deliberately confuse the public mind

with padded cablegrams, deceptive head-lines and falsified news.
