THE TRUTH HURTS.

The Morning Glory's News Service Gotten by Use of Scissors.

We don't have to traduce our common enemy of the Daily Morning Glory to show to the people that he has been using them as suckers to further a little notoriety boom he had under his hat. We don't have to use a page of our paper to malign the fellow who knows it all. We have bombarded his own statements in regard to where he gets his news service and his fortifications have crumbled. We gave the Spaniard a thrust with plain truth and he comes back at us with the only weapon this race uses, imprecations and foul mouthed lies. But to the point: Last week we exposed the statement that he received the news service through the Omaha Bee. This week we are able to tell you where he received the bulk of his news and also show that the people could have read this news the evening before in the St. Louis Republic. On last Friday night we went to the depot and purchased on the train a St. Louis Republic dated Friday morning, May 6, which was printed that morning between midnight and 3 o'clock, and behold the Morning Glory came out Saturday morning with three long scissored articles taken from this paper word for word. For seven days this paper came out with dispatches bearing the copyright signature of James Gordon Bennett, W. R. Hearst and The Associated Press. Where did he get these? A cablegram costs money. A copyrighted cablegram or anything else copyrighted is protected by the government and a penalty of \$100 is imposed if used without authority as the following will show: "The law imposes a penalty of \$100 upon any person, who has not obtained a copyright who shall insert these words, 'Copyrighted, 18—, by ———' or words of the same import in or upon a book or other article." It will be seen therefore that if it was not for his poverty the editor of the Morning Glory would have to put up considerable hard cash and also have suits against him for damages. The St. Louis Republic above referred to publishes these copyrights and they were gotten by the Daily Joke by the scissors route.
LATER—The Morning Glory died this morning.
Late reliable advices state that San Juan, Porto Rico, has been bombarded by Sampson's big fleet and the forts reduced to ashes and the guns silenced. Dewey sends another warship to the bottom with the gubcoat Concord. The U. S. torpedo boat Winslow in an engagement in Cardenas harbor was crippled and five of her men killed and several wounded.

City Council.

Council met as per adjournment of the 4th, with Mayor Beck presiding and Aldermen Hollister, Wright and Rife present.
Mayor administered oath of office to city clerk after which minutes of last meeting were read and approved.
Mayor appointed J. M. Sellars city engineer for the ensuing year, salary to be \$48 per month and coal for his own use. Appointment confirmed.
Mayor appointed M. W. Dickerson as water commissioner, street commissioner, and city marshal for the ensuing year at terms stated in his proposition, \$30 per month. Appointment confirmed and oath of office administered.
Petition of Wm. Harris asking appointment as night watch read and upon motion Mr. Harris was authorized to act as night watch at a salary of \$10 per month.
Motion prevailed to lay petition of J. G. Sapp for night watch on the table.
Motion prevailed to lay petition of H. B. Kinsel relating to position of city engineer on the table.
The following committees were appointed:
Auditing—Wright and Spokesfield.
Streets and alleys—1st ward, Spokesfield; 2d ward, Wright.
Printing—Spokesfield and Rife.
Water agreement of C. B. & Q. railroad was read and clerk was authorized to notify said railroad that rate for furnishing water had been advanced from \$20 to \$25 per month.
Official bond of M. W. Dickerson was read and approved and placed on file.
Bond of L. E. Tait was read and approved and ordered placed on file.
Bond of city treasurer was read and approved and placed on file and treasurer sworn in.
On motion council adjourned.
F. P. Hadley was caught burglarizing the A. R. Reynolds meat market last Sunday morning about 1 a. m. and shot through the fleshy part of the thigh by Herbert Cook. He was arrested and brought before Judge Duffy Monday for preliminary hearing, and bound over to the district court in the sum of five hundred dollars. He was taken before Judge Bealle Tuesday morning before the district court being in session, and on pleading guilty was given the minimum sentence, one year in the penitentiary at hard labor.
A degraded female, known well in this city as "Dick," is at present in durance vile at the Hotel de Wells, on a charge of attempting to poison her child with laudanum. The child was found in a precarious condition under one of the trees south of the depot where she had left it. By strenuous efforts the life of the child was saved although it was at first supposed to be dead when found.
