When the twister crossed the railroad it took down eight telegraph poles; then next struck a new one story frame house which was completely destroyed with no insurance. The fine two story house of Elijah Eaton and a large barn. Loss \$2,000 with insurance of \$1,300. Some cattle and hogs were also killed here. The family took refuge in the cellar and escaped injury. From there it went north east and demolished the one story house of a man named Simington along with the outbuildings. Loss about \$800 with no insurance. Then it took the roof off a stone house belonging to a Mr. Stevenson. The house of a man by the name of Taylor was wrecked and one of his little daughters had a leg broken. Along the track of the storm farther northeast much damage was done.
