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WAR NOTES IN BRIEF.

The first choice of acquired islands should be given to the Merimac crew. Admiral Dewey has been elected an honorary member of the New York Historical society. According to the Madrid newspapers there is no space left on the Spanish standard for another victory to perch. Work on the old monitors and gun boats is being rapidly pushed at the League Island navy yard, Philadelphia. Admiral Cervera's offer to exchange Lieut. Hobson and his party was magnanimous, but has not been followed up on his part. The bottle recently corked by Lieut. Hobson at Santiago appears to have had the same old directions, "well shaken before taken." Military surgeons claim that a man stops growing at 28 years of age. However the rule has no application in the case of Lieut. Hobson. A Madrid dispatch to the London Times says that the Spanish believe that the Americans are tired of the war and will gladly make peace. Rear Admiral Sampson has officially declared that the purpose of the bombardment of the fortifications at Santiago was to clear the way for troops. One of Spain's naval arms is buried at Manila, and another is imprisoned at Santiago. From now on young Alphonso will have to rely largely upon his legs. Dewey's next job at Manila will be to raise the sunken Spanish fleet. He will be coming back to America some day with twice as many ships as he had originally. The condition of Spain is a first class argument for popular education. Keeping 65 per cent of the people in ignorance even of the alphabet is a costly business. The big and fast auxiliary cruisers could be well employed in carrying troops to Santiago. They are well armed and no Spanish gunboat would cross their path. Our troops on the way to Manila will be surprised when they arrive and find our flag over the town. Their congratulations to Dewey will be a fine spectacle in the harbor. There has been but little derangement of commerce in the United States by reason of the war, but a considerable derangement of Spanish fortifications has resulted. So far as the Philippine question is concerned, the European nations have agreed with wonderful unanimity that the United States is entitled to the whole shooting match. In the Spanish cortex the government is attacked from all sides. Sagasta denies government responsibility for the disaster at Manila or for Admiral Cervera's tactics. A baker's loaf of bread in Havana has been reduced in size so often that it weighs now less than one ounce. If this continues the city will fall before many weeks from spontaneous exhaustion. No doubt Blanco will see to it that the jaw bones of all these "mules" killed during bombardment will be out of reach when Sampson affects a landing on Cuban soil. Otherwise history may again repeat itself.

Certainly no people can excel the Spaniards in courtesy. Every time they sustain a defeat the minister on

duty at that particular hour proceeds to cable congratulations to the vanquished and retreating countrymen.

On account of shallow water only some of our smaller vessels could take part in the bombardment of Guantanamo, but they were entirely equal to the work. They faced the Spanish batteries and quickly silenced them.

A San Francisco dispatch says that the destination of the cruiser Charleston is the island of Guahan, in the Ladrone group, which is controlled by Spain. The group, it is stated, will be seized and a coaling station established on the Guahan.

Geographers say that the summer climate of Cuba is better than is generally supposed in the United States. The opinion usually held is based on the bad sanitary condition of Havana, Matanzas and some other of the seaports.

A dispatch from London quotes from the Daily Chronicle as follows: "The Philippines are lost to Spain. Up till recently it was possible to conceive that the United States might make peace by accepting the surrender of Cuba and Porto Rico, allowing Spain to keep the Philippines, but already that dream is over."

In speaking of the heroes of the Merimac, Commodore Schley said: "Hobson led a forlorn hope without the power to cut his way out. But fortune once more favored the brave, and I hope he will receive the recognition and promotion he deserves. His name will live as long as the heroes of the world are remembered."

First Regiment Tennessee Volunteers Passes Through Red Cloud Going to the Philippines. On Saturday the information was announced from Agent Conover that four train loads of volunteers would pass through the city on their way to San Francisco. No definite information as to the time of their arrival was given until later in the day when it was learned that they were due here between 8 and 9 o'clock Sunday morning. Of course this announcement brought the general public who heard it to the depot for several train loads of real live troops are not seen in the city every day. After a considerable wait it was announced that the first train was approaching and a general stampede was made to get in on the ground floor and get a glimpse of the boys in blue. As the train rolled into the depot a mighty shout of welcome went up from the assembled crowd and was returned by the soldiers who were found to be the 1st section of the first battalion of Tennessee Volunteers. The band accompanying the train soon formed and treated the assembly to some patriotic airs. The ladies and young girls of the town were by this time acquainted and picking up innumerable souvenirs for which they traded flowers, hat pins and any old thing. While some of them most likely lost their heads and acted a little indiscreet, it was passed over with the thought that their enthusiasm had been "shotted up" too long and when it cooled they got a little bit excited. The four sections comprising the three battalions were finally all in but the boys comprising the volunteers while in many cases were fine looking specimens of unshod would not rank with our own Nebraska boys. Most of them seemed to be cigarette fiends and we well know that this is one of the causes of knocking out many of the volunteers in this state. The four sections, comprised some forty or forty-five cars and there was some twelve hundred men and as the boys had just been paid off the Friday previous there was a large wad of wealth on board and the eating houses at the depot were completely cleaned out of eatables and drinkables. The trains were delayed here for several hours and some good drills were gone through with. They finally pulled out for the west with many well wishes of Godspeed from the assembled crowd.

Out in Denver when the Colorado troops were about to start for the front a Denver girl was heard to exclaim as she kissed a soldier good bye, "God bless you, stand up for Colorado." The gallant volunteer replied in a voice that was husky with emotion, "I'm from Nebraska, ma'am, but I'll try to stand up for both states."

The Mirror and Farmer contains the following instructions for killing lice on chicks: As a spray for poultry houses use kerosene emulsion (or kerosene), adding a pint of sassafras oil and half a pint of crude carbolic acid to a gallon of kerosene emulsion.
