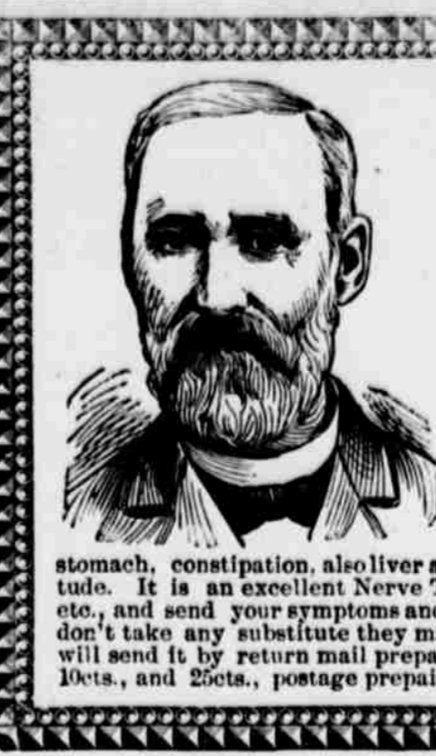

### ORDINANCE, NO. 30.

AN ORDINANCE imposing an Occupation Tax on the Fire Insurance Companies, Corporations or Associations doing business in the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska, for the use, support and benefit of the Volunteer Fire Department of said city.  
Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska:  
Section 1.—That an Occupation Tax of Five Dollars per annum is hereby imposed on each Fire Insurance Corporation, Company or Association doing business in the City of Red Cloud, for the use, support and benefit of the Volunteer Fire Department of said city.  
Section 2.—Any Fire Insurance Corporation, Company or Association desiring to engage in the business or now engaged in the business of writing fire insurance in the City of Red Cloud shall pay to the City Treasurer of Red Cloud the sum of Five Dollars and shall file the receipt thereof with the City Clerk, who upon payment of his fee therefor, shall thereupon issue to the applicant a certificate showing that said applicant has paid the Occupation Tax as herein provided for the current municipal year.  
Section 3.—It shall be unlawful for any Fire Insurance Corporation, Company or Association or any person in their behalf as Agent or otherwise, to engage in the business of writing fire insurance in the City of Red Cloud without having first paid said occupation tax and produced said certificate as herein provided.  
Section 4.—The said tax shall be by the said treasurer accredited to a special fund which is hereby created and to be known as a "Fire Department Fund" and the money so paid and accredited shall be by the city treasurer paid out only on warrants drawn by the city council of said city, upon orders or bills authorized by the president or vice president of the Red Cloud Fire Department, duly countersigned by its secretary and by no other person whatsoever.  
Section 5.—Any Fire Insurance Corporation, Company or Association or any person or persons on their behalf as agents or otherwise that shall write fire insurance in said city without paying said license as herein provided, shall upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum not less than Ten Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars for each offense and effect from and after its passage and publication.
