Nearly every other town in the state is enjoying a base ball craze. Red Cloud still enjoys the pleasure of being the quietest town in the valley.

The fifth annual picnic of the Franklin County Log-Rolling Association will be held in the grove on the fair grounds at Franklin next Tuesday. An extensive program of amusements and sports has been arranged for the occasion.

Notwithstanding the drought of the past season the state fair held at Lincoln this week was above the average. The agricultural exhibits were fine and the attendance large. It was one of the most successful state fairs that has been held for some years.

The Acheson Globe says: "An Acheson man who recently visited New York came back thoroughly shocked. It is already claimed that a convention that departs so widely from the traditions of the party cannot be 'regular.'"

A number of reports have come to us recently wherein many former mid-landers and fusionists have openly expressed themselves as going to vote the republican ticket straight this fall. The republican county ticket is made up of good, clean men, and there appears to be nothing for the pops to squeal about. There is little doubt but that the republicans will sweep everything in Webster county this fall.

Red Cloud has made more advancement during the past eight months than it did in the previous eight years, and why should the improvement stop. Why not continue with the good work? There is still plenty of room for improvement. There are still a number of old shacks on main street which should be torn down and new buildings erected in their places. Beside the other buildings along the street they are very unsightly.

From the tenure of the state press it is difficult to determine the exact feeling of the people in regard to the cancelling of the Bartley parole by Gov. Savage and sending him back to the state penitentiary. A large number of the state papers are of the same opinion as the CHIEF and think that after forty-five days of the parole had elapsed he should have been allowed the other fifteen. We are confident of one thing, and that is, if the editor of this paper had two hundred thousand dollars, (emphasize the if) and someone stole it, we would be perfectly willing to give him sixty days to make restitution if he could, providing we had absolute control of him. And it is the same way with the state of Nebraska. Governor Savage's action in giving Bartley a parole merely gave him a chance to have a portion of his sentence commuted and gave the state a chance to recover a portion of the money which had been lost through his mismanagement. And there is no law, divine or human, that will not permit a man to right a wrong he has done when it is within his power so to do.

Senator George W. Vest of Missouri, in a letter to a friend, in speaking of Bryan says: "If I could do so I would put Col. Bryan in the United States senate, where he would take high rank and be invaluable to his party and country. His ability, courage and honesty are unquestionable, but I do not think him a great leader. Leadership is a peculiar and a rare talent. A man may be a lawyer, orator and statesman yet not necessarily be a good leader. Jefferson, VanBuren, Lincoln and McKinley have been the greatest political leaders and managers in this country, and Mr. McKinley has never had a superior in that regard. I have the kindest feeling for Col. Bryan, and regard him as one of the best campaigners this country has ever produced. Like all of us, he has made mistakes, and I think he is now mistaken in advising the democrats of the United States to permit no one to go as a delegate to the national convention who is not in favor of the Chicago and Kansas City platforms in every clause. This simply means that the free coinage of silver will be made a leading issue and it will drive away from us thousands of good democrats who are anxious to remain with the party."
