J. W. Sherwood, one of Red Cloud's old and highly respected citizens, died at his home in the northwest part of the city last Saturday, after an illness of a little over a year. John Wharton Sherwood was born in New York City, on February 4, 1826, and at the time of his death was aged 75 years, 8 months and 15 days. He came to Red Cloud with his family in 1879, and has been a resident of this city ever since. Deceased leaves a wife and three children to mourn his loss. The funeral services were held from the residence on Monday, and were conducted by Rev. C. L. Hamilton. The remains were laid at rest in the Red Cloud cemetery.

A young lad who had a fondness for riding a bicycle and a desire to see something of the outside world gave his people who reside at Ohioa, considerable worry and put them to considerable expense before he was located in this city Wednesday. On Sunday last he appropriated his brother's wheel and started out with no set idea as to his destination other than to let his wheel follow the road. He arrived here on Tuesday evening and continued southwest and made his camp near the Goble ranch. In the early morning he appeared at this place and got breakfast stating that he had had nothing to eat since noon the day before, and also applied for work. During the day he came to town with the man who lives on the ranch and was nabbed by O. T. Gove an officer of Ohioa who accompanied by the boy's brother, W. D. Gilbert, had come here in search of him. He was an innocent looking lad and this was his first experience of being away from home.
