Some time ago an ordinance was passed by the city council making it compulsory on the part of insurance companies to pay into the city treasury the sum of five dollars as a fund to help in the maintenance of the fire department. This paper at the request of the fire department advocated the measure and by considerable work on their part the council made it an ordinance law. Several insurance companies, through their agents, each paid in their five dollars, and then as usual the ordinance and the collection of the money was lost sight of and became a dead letter. The fire department should not be treated in this manner, but steps should be taken for the collection of this money and the treasurer should be ordered by the council to do so. If the amounts are uncollectable the sums already collected should be returned to the parties who have paid.
