Last Friday evening the third of the course of high school entertainments was given at the Christian church, when Fuller Swift gave one of his unique and very interesting lectures to a large audience. We have had numerous inquiries of late by our citizens in the following words: "Why don't the CHIEF advocate the lighting of our city? It is a shame and disgrace to a town the size of Red Cloud to have dark streets after 7 p.m." And with them we are willing to heartily agree. There ought to be lights on our streets after 7 p.m. when the stores close. We are all ready and willing to admit that. But, what is the proper method of lighting our streets? That is the question. Some say electric lights, and others, (we might say the majority of our population) say no more electric lights for us, we have had a plenty, and again we heartily agree. At this age and stage of the world electric lights are a back number and too expensive to even be thought of. And again numerous towns throughout the state are being lighted with the new gas lamps. This is what we would advocate for Red Cloud. Electric lights at \$100 to \$125 per month are too expensive. We believe that our city could be lighted with gas lamps at one-fourth this price after the lamps had once been put in, and the cost of putting them in would not be over \$500 at the most. The new gasoline lamps of the present time are almost the equal of the arc electric light in lighting power, and can be operated at one-tenth the cost. Why not light our city with them? When a move is made to light our city with gas lamps we are willing to do all in our power to help the good cause along but we will not advocate electric lights as we believe they are too expensive a luxury to burden our city with.
