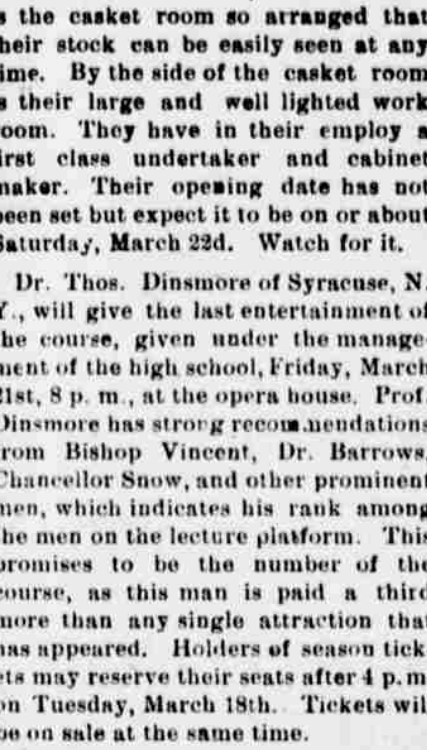
Prof. Aller of the Franklin academy says that they have secured Dinsmore for the third time and consider him their strongest attraction. He recommends him very highly.
