The congressional convention which met in Hastings Tuesday was one of the most enthusiastic political gatherings it has ever been our good fortune to see. The convention was harmonious in every act and the predictions of the delegates were such as to make the nominee feel that his election was sure. Judge G. W. Norris of McCook was nominated on the fifth formal ballot. The vote on the informal ballot was: Norris, 66; McCreary, 22; Prince, 19; Adams, 22; Lowe, 26; Christy, 23. Norris gained steadily on each ballot, the fifth formal ballot resulting: Norris, 85; McCreary, 24; Prince, 17; Christy, 20; Adams, 30. Before the result of the vote was announced a motion was made by Hall county and seconded by Nuckolls county to make the nomination unanimous. Judge Norris was born in Santusky, O., June 11, 1861, and came to Nebraska in 1885. He is serving his second term as district judge in a district which in the last campaign gave the fusion state ticket a majority of more than 600, while he was given a majority of more than 400.

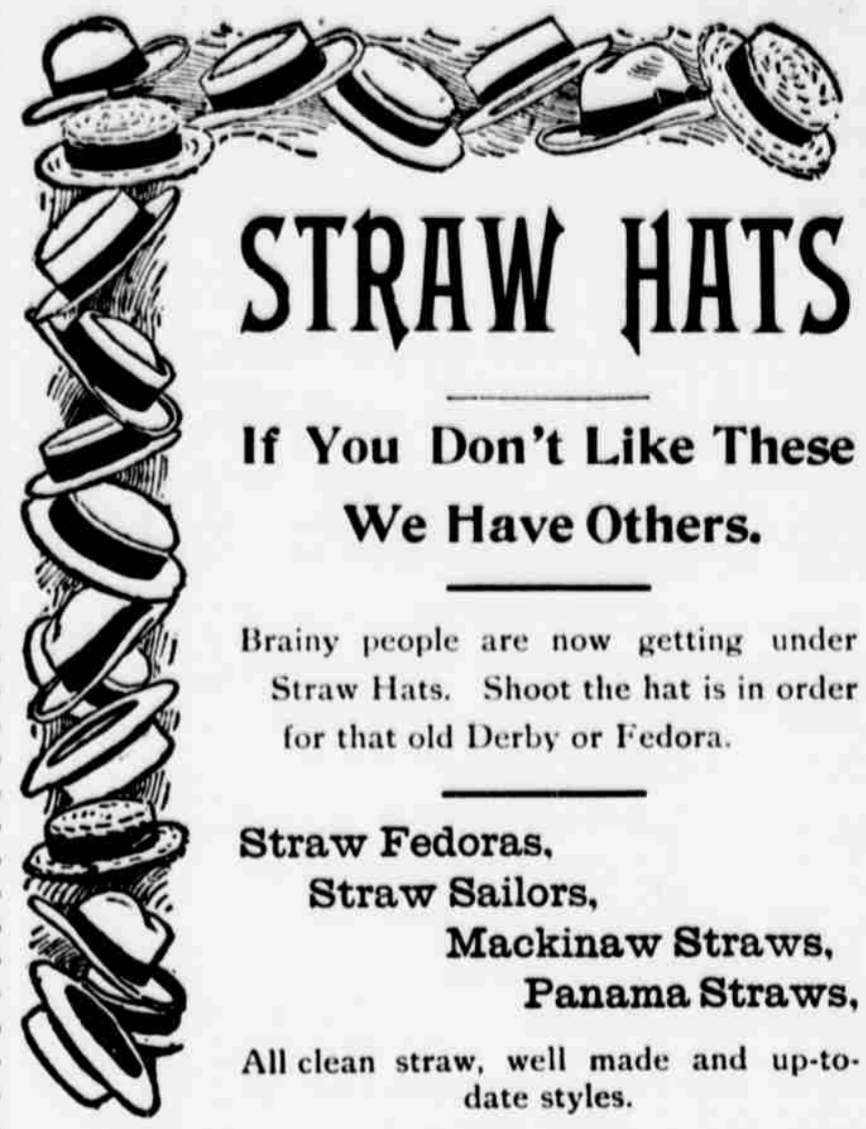
