Spellbinders who hire out by the day to the "reform" committees of Nebraska will show wisdom in collecting their salaries in advance. Such a policy would have saved Mrs. Gougar \$450 in hard cash and the troublesome necessity of proving to a jury of her peers that she earned it by the sweat of her jaw.

According to the Agricultural department at Washington the average wheat and corn yield in Nebraska is greater than that of any other state in the Union. The average winter wheat yield is given at 22 bushels per acre, Missouri is second with an average of 18 bushels and the average of the winter wheat country is but 13.8 bushels.

At a meeting of county officers in Lincoln last week it was decided to ask the legislature to pass a law making the terms of county officers 4 years in stead of two. It seems to be the sentiment of those present at the meeting that when an officer was elected for only two years he immediately commenced scheming for a second term. They also contended that a county officer could not make anything during one year term. While a county officer may not be able to make anything in a single term and it might also be advisable to extend the term on account of the election expenses, yet when an incompetent has been elected 4 years might be long to wait to get rid of him.

This law provides that all road tax shall be paid in cash. One-half of all money paid from the several road districts constitutes a county road fund and is divided equally among the commissioners to be expended in each commissioner district for the construction and repair of bridges, culverts, etc. The other half is returned to the road district from which it is collected to be expended in that road district. It will be seen from the above that each commissioner has an equal amount of money to expend in his district and that one has no advantage over another only as the size of the districts vary.

There has not been a time in the last several years when it was lawful to seine for fish and no one can claim that the breaking of the law in this respect is done innocently. The officers and also the person who informed on the persons arrested and fined last Saturday for violating the game law did just right. If the law is wrong, then it may be repealed, and if it is enforced on all alike then there will be no talk of favoritism. The birds and game protected by this law are the farmers' best friends, living as they do on worms and insects, and not destroying crops, as is believed by many. That these birds do live on the worms and insects has been proven by the examination of thousands of stomachs in the Agricultural department of the United States. The bird stomachs are sent to the department by farmers and the biological department, when in the field.

**Cattle Thieves at Work**  
Last Tuesday night twenty head of cattle belonging to August Roats were taken from his pasture, six miles south of this city, and were driven south into Kansas. George Whittwer heard the cattle going past his place during the night, and the next morning, upon missing one of his own cattle, he started out to follow them up. He discovered the tracks of one of the cattle returning and supposing it belonged to him he followed the track to Roats' pasture, where he found the animal, but as it proved to be one of Roats' and as the pasture fence was down he reported the matter to Mr. Roats here in town. Mr. Roats immediately took steps to discover the whereabouts of his cattle and finally, on Wednesday, received word from Esbon that there were some cattle there which might belong to him. Mr. Roats went to Esbon Wednesday afternoon and positively identified the cattle there as belonging to him. He notified Sheriff McArthur to come to Esbon at once, which he did. The cattle were found in the possession of L. C. Fitch, who claims to have bought them. Sheriff McArthur and Frank Kuehn went to Esbon Wednesday to bring them back, but Fitch refused to surrender them. County Attorney Overman went over yesterday and today will replevin them. Mr. Roats identified them by each having a round hole punched in its right ear, which was adopted some time ago as his method of marking his cattle.

**Game Law Violators.**  
Last Saturday deputy game warden W. H. Scott of Blue Hill and City Marshal Ludlow arrested for violation of the game laws of this state, C. C. White, A. P. Bailes and Kelley, O'Neil all of Burr Oak, Kansas. Their trial was held before Judge West, and all entered a plea of guilty, and were assessed a fine of \$10 each and costs. The costs amounted to about \$5 in each case, making about \$15 which each person had to pay. These men had come to this county, with their wives and some of their wives' friends, for the purpose of camping out, hunting, fishing and having a good time generally, little thinking that they were breaking a state law. The fine assessed was the minimum fine which could have been assessed in cases of this kind and which under the circumstances was but right and proper. The \$30 fine collected is, according to law, put into the school fund and the persons on whose complaint the arrest was made receive from the county general fund an amount equal to half of the fine, or \$15.

**Death of Mrs. Joseph Cox.**  
Mrs. Joseph Cox of Oriole township, Smith county, Kansas, died very suddenly last Tuesday evening, from the bursting of an abscess. Funeral services were held at Oriole school house Wednesday afternoon, and interment was in the Oriole cemetery. Mrs. Cox was born in England and was 59 years of age at the time of her death. She leaves to mourn her death, besides her husband, five sons and three daughters, all of whom are married. The attendance at the funeral was exceptionally large. Mr. and Mrs. Cox were among the oldest and most highly respected settlers of Smith county, they having homesteaded there in there in the early days. The deceased was quite well known in Red Cloud and had many friends here who will regret to learn of her death.
