With one breath the Demos are heralding the Republicans for the trust and in the next breath are doing the same for the meat trust. When will they learn that trusts, as such, are non-partisan, and care not little for political parties? The Republican party is as much against trusts as any other, but at the same time is broad enough to realize that trusts, besides being injurious, are built up by combining the various manufacturing plants of the nation, and are combined partly for the purpose of remaining alive. Thursday was election day in Tennessee. The returns are coming in slowly from the mountain districts. Those compiled so far show three men killed in Knoxville, election boxes stolen by the clerks and judges, secret counts, etc. In one district no election was held, as the factions "were unable to agree." This makes a fair showing, even for Tennessee, and leads us to hope that another "campaign of education" will result in enlightening the citizens of that great commonwealth to such a degree as to make it unnecessary for them to hold any more elections.—Nebraska City Weekly.

Owing to the number of cattle dying from cane disease Mousel Bros. sent some cane to the university experiment station to be analyzed. Last week the geologist and chemist for the state made a trip to this part of the state for the purpose of experimenting. They appraised one of W. E. Smith's cows and fed her some of the cane which had caused the death of several animals for Mr. Smith. The cane got in its work quickly and the cow was sick in fifteen minutes. The cane was found to contain prussic acid and is caused by stunted growth. If the cane is allowed to cure this acid will evaporate and leave the cane in a harmless condition. It seemed to be the opinion of the experts that prussic acid did not exist in cane of a rank growth and that the only danger was in feeding stunted cane before it had time to cure.—Cambridge Clarion.

GENERAL FRANZ SIEGEL DEAD.

Famous Union General Passes Peacefully Away as a Result of Old Age.

General Franz Siegel, the famous soldier and editor, died at his home in New York city Thursday morning. He had been failing in health for the last two years, the result of old age and a general break-down, but it was only last Sunday that he finally surrendered and took to his bed. The end was peaceful, and the members of his family were present at his bedside when death came.

Franz Siegel, a general of the civil war, was born at Simsbach, Baden, in November, 1824. He graduated at the military school at Karlsruhe and served as an officer in the army of the Grand Duke of Baden, obtaining the rank of lieutenant in 1847. In 1848 he took part in the unsuccessful campaign against the Poles and at the dissolution of the provisional government withdrew to Switzerland, but was not permitted to remain there, and sailed to the United States, reaching New York in 1850. Here he taught mathematics for some years in the academy of Dr. August Dison, whose daughter he afterward married.

In 1858 he removed to St. Louis and became a teacher in a college in that city. At the outbreak of the civil war he received a commission as colonel of the Third Missouri volunteers, stationed at Camp Jackson. He gained prominence in the campaign in Missouri.

In 1862 he received a commission as a brigadier general and followed General Price's army when the Confeder-

ates were obliged to retreat to Arkansas. On March 7, 1863 the armies met at Pea Ridge, the Confederates then being under Van Dorn. A severe battle followed. The victory was entirely due to Siegel's skillful maneuvers. In this engagement the Union force was less than 10,000, the Confederates being twice as strong. The following May the authorities at Washington showed their recognition of the value of his services by appointing him major general. He took part in the second battle of Bull Run, August 29 and 30, 1862, and on September 14 was made commander of the Eleventh army corps. He was placed in command of the department of West Virginia, and was with Grant in his advance against General Lee.

Since the war General Siegel has resided in New York city, taking some interest in politics. In 1871 he was elected registrar of the city of New York, and in 1885 he was appointed a pension agent.

In Justice to Ed Gilford.

Dear Sir—I read the account of the fusion senatorial convention in THE CHIEF. While having no doubt it was a fair and just account of the proceedings, it does, however, falsify to the public mind the true facts, and I write this that your readers can have an opportunity to digest the facts as they are and to remove any doubt that Mr. Gilford had any personal interest in the matter. In the first place Mr. Gilford was one of the delegates representing this precinct. Sprecher's letter as to those matters, and prominent independents from Pleasant Hill, Elm Creek, Oak Creek and Stillwater asked him to present it at the senatorial convention and to Mr. O. R. Pitney. Mr. Pitney denied its accuracy until he found there was a record in the county clerk's office, and now hangs onto his plea of absence, while his voucher for pay shows he was not absent. To the many independents of this county it seems strange that a request for an explanation to their constituents should be met first by falsehood, second by sneers by the machine, who expect to reap some unknown benefit.

Mr. Brooks never was a Pop when G. P. Cather was, and his highest ambition is to down said Cather in his own precinct regardless of any principle; and I desire it to be understood that Mr. Gilford's inquiry in this matter was as a representative of prominent independents, every one of whom supported this legislative contingent that so lamely explain their action. This is not going to rest as it is, but it is unjust to Mr. Gilford to be branded as a sorehead while he is carrying out the demands of those who elected him.

A Great Convention

The 1902 convention of the Disciples of Christ will be held in Omaha, Neb., October 15-23. A rate of one fare for the round trip has been made from all parts of the country, and it is confidently expected that upwards of 30,000 visitors will attend. The citizens of Omaha are making extensive preparations for the entertainment of delegates and visitors. The sessions of the convention will be held in the Coliseum, which will seat with comfort 12,000 people.

The growth of the Disciples of Christ as a church organization is one of the marvels of the religious world. Its percentage of growth exceeds that of any protestant denomination, and the church now numbers upwards of 1,300,000 communicants in the United States.

The late president, James A. Garfield, was a minister of the Disciples church. Before his election to the presidency Mr. Garfield was asked to state concisely the doctrinal position of the church to which he belonged. He complied with the request and formulated the following statement:

1. We call ourselves Christians or Disciples.
2. We believe in God the Father.
3. We believe that Jesus is the Christ the son of the living God and our Savior. We regard the divinity of Christ as the fundamental truth of the Christian system.
4. We believe in the Holy Spirit both as to His agency in conversion and as a dweller in the heart of the Christian.
5. We accept both the Old and the New Testament as the inspired word of God.
6. We believe in the future punishment of the wicked and the reward of the righteous.
7. We believe that Deity is a prayer hearing and a prayer answering God.
8. We observe the institution of the Lord's Supper on every Lord's Day. To this table we neither invite nor debar; we say it is the Lord's Supper for all the Lord's children.
9. We plead for the union of all God's people on the Bible and the Bible alone.
10. The Lord's Word is our "Book of Discipline."
11. We maintain that all the ordinances should be observed as they were in the days of the apostles.
