Red Cloud Council No 447 F. A. A. will hold their next regular meeting, Friday, September 26th, in the Potter Hall all members are requested to be present.

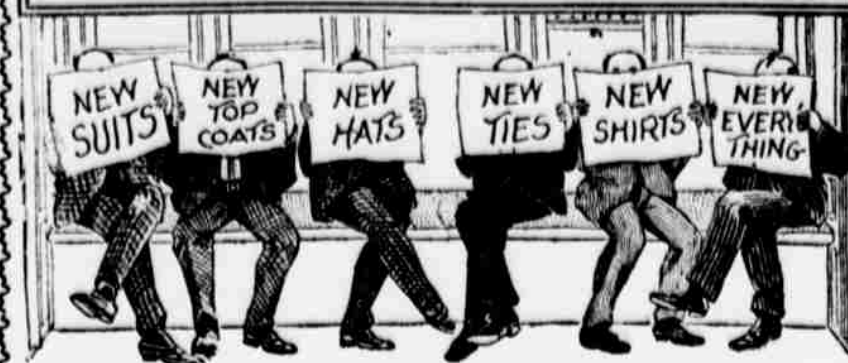
