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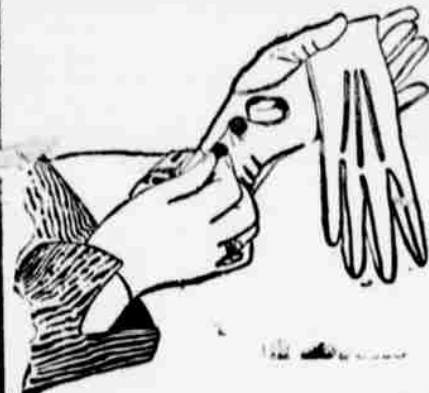

Mrs. Albert Thompson is enjoying a visit from her mother and sister from Aurora this week.

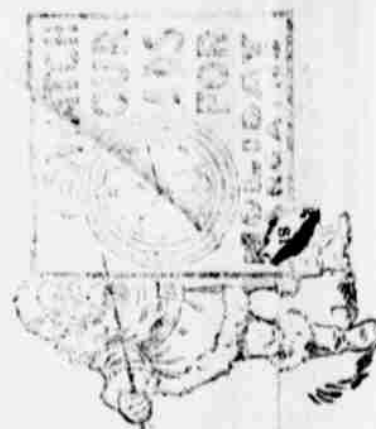
Mrs. L. Busey was called to Colorado last Sunday by the serious illness of a brother and niece.
