We Recognize the Flavor.

It was the United States that had to eat crow a few years ago when she resorted to arbitration over her seal fishery dispute with the Canadians. The arbitrators declared the seal to be a wild animal and consequently not an appendage to the Pribilof islands, out in Bering sea, that belonged to Uncle Sam. Our government was protecting the great herds of seals that bred on these islands and that, between times, ranged all over the sea. The seals were multiplying rapidly under this system of farming and the revenue cutters and gunboats of the govern-

ment were making good our claim that all the stray seals in the northern Pacific belonged to Uncle Sam's private Pribilof herd. Then the Canadians sent out a fleet of ships to hunt our seals and they slaughtered so many on the open sea that that the herd was in danger of extermination. Uncle Sam captured a lot of the "seal pirates" and confiscated their barges and ships also. There was a row and we arbitrated. The arbitrators agreed that we hadn't any title and we had to pay a good many millions of smart money to the Canadian "pirates" and apologize for chasing them out of the Pacific. It hurt pretty badly and sundry proposals were made in congress for evening up the account. One was to kill every blamed seal on the islands at the next camping time and thus cut off the supplies to the Canadian hunters. But this didn't prevail. The hunting became so bad right away after the decision went against us that the Canadians engaged in it went bankrupt and so the money losses stand about even, but we have lost nearly all of our seals. Our only revenge was an act prohibiting the importation of any seal skins into this country that have not the private mark of our fishery on them. But that doesn't help us much.—Nebraska State Journal.
