Why Armor Plate is Costly.

The general public has always been mystified at the extremely high price paid for armor plate. According to the iron and steel number of the Scientific American, the most important item is the great length of t me required for the successful manufacture of a plate is being constantly worked upon, either in furnace, forge machine shop, or annealing and tempering department, for a continuous period of nine months Other causes of high cost are: the large number of separate operations, the frequency with which the great masses must be transported, and the distances which they must be carried in their journey from one department to another.
