Developments in the far eastern war are lagging.

How does Al Galusha for secretary of state strike you?

The Burkett senatorial boom seems to have taken another spurt.

The selection of a chairman for the national Republican committee is just now worrying the leaders.

Occasionally reports of Russian victories are sent out from the east, but they are invariably followed by official denials.

To add to the muddled condition of affairs in the far east, Bulgaria has begun to show a disposition to worry the Turk a little.

The Japanese have accomplished a smooth diplomatic coup by negotiating a treaty with Korea guaranteeing the independence of that country if Japan should be successful in the war with Russia.

The Panama canal treaty was ratified by the United States Senate Tuesday by an overwhelming majority. The Republicans voted solidly for the bill, while the democratic vote was evenly divided—fourteen for and fourteen against the measure.

The Republican valley is entitled to representation on the state ticket. Al Galusha of this city has announced his candidacy for the office of secretary of state, and united effort on the part of the Republicans of this section of the state will land him in the office.

The last written words of Senator Hanna were contained in a message from the dying man to President Roosevelt, in which he thanked the president for his kindness in calling on him during his sickness. The message assured the president of the writer's friendship and appreciation of his kindness.

With the approach of the time for city election, candidates for city offices are becoming alarmingly scarce, and fear is expressed in some quarters that ere election day rolls around the city offices will be under the painful necessity of getting out their drag-nets and going in search of men to fill themselves.

After the exposure of his connection with the postoffice scandal, Perry S. Heath was repeatedly urged to resign his position as secretary of the Republican national committee, but he persistently refused to do so. However, the death of Senator Hanna, chairman of the committee, left Mr. Heath without a friend in that body and he relieved the committee of the necessity of "firing" him by promptly tendering his resignation.

## Al Galusha for Secretary of State.

THE CHIEF takes pleasure this week in announcing the candidacy of Mr. Al Galusha of this city for the office of secretary of state, subject to the action of the Republican state convention to be held May 18.

No man in the state is better qualified for the office, or more deserving of honors at the hands of the Republican party.

Mr. Galusha has lived in Red Cloud for twenty years, and during all these years he has been closely identified with the business interests of the city. He has worked unceasingly for the success of the Republican party and Republican principles, without money or reward, and the Republicans of Nebraska will make no mistake if they honor him with the nomination for the office of secretary of state.

It has been many years since the Republican valley has been represented on the Republican state ticket, and the time is ripe for this section of the state to assert its claims to recognition.

ANNOUNCED IN LINCOLN.

Wednesday's Lincoln Daily Star has the following comment on Mr. Galusha's candidacy:

"Southwestern Nebraska will furnish a candidate for the Republican nomination for secretary of state in the person of Mr. A. Galusha of Red Cloud. Mr. Galusha was in Lincoln Wednesday and expects to appear in the convention not only with strong local support, but also with support in all sections of the state.

"Mr. Galusha is an old resident of twenty-five years standing in Nebraska, having resided twenty years in Webster county. Though active and always interested in Republican politics, he has never before asked for office for himself. He has a personal acquaintance extending all over the state. He has been prominently identified with the A. O. U. W., and is the secretary of the finance committee of the grand lodge for the state.

"Republicans of the Fifth congressional district point out the fact that they will have no representation in the state offices next January unless conceded a place on the state ticket." The State Journal has the following in regard to Mr. Galusha's announcement:

"A. Galusha of Red Cloud was in Lincoln yesterday and while here announced his candidacy for the position of secretary of state. Mr. Galusha was mentioned by his friends for the position of clerk of the supreme court when candidates were being named for this office, but he never decided to be a candidate for that place. He expects to come to the convention with strong backing from Webster county and vicinity.

"Mr. Galusha is prominent in the A. O. U. W., being secretary of the finance committee of the grand lodge. His personal acquaintance extends over the entire state. He has lived in the state twenty-five years and has always been a strong republican."

## LATE WAR NEWS.

### Partially Confirmed Report of Russian Victory.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 26, 2:45 a. m.—A telegram from Viceroy Alexieff to the czar says:

"At a quarter before 3 on the morning of February 24 numerous Japanese torpedo boats attempted to attack the battleship Retvizan and to sink large steamers loaded with inflammables. The Retvizan was the first to observe the torpedo boats and opened a strong fire on them. She was supported by the land batteries. She destroyed two steamers near the entrance to the harbor, which were coming directly towards her. The Retvizan observed four steamers in a sinking condition and eight torpedo boats departing slowly to join the waiting Japanese warships. A portion of the crews of the Japanese vessels were drowned. The grounded steamer is still burning. The enemy is observed in the offing of Port Arthur in two lines.

"The entrance of the harbor is open. I attribute the complete derangement of the enemy's plan to the brilliant action and destructive fire of the Retvizan. We had no loss."

It seems that the Japs were attempting to emulate Hobson's feat at Santiago, by attempting to sink several vessels laden with stone at the mouth of harbor of Port Arthur, thereby shutting off the escape of the Russian squadron.

The Retvizan is an American built vessel and is one of the ships reported to have been crippled by the Japanese in the battle of February 14.
