The First district congressional convention Tuesday renominated Elmer J. Burkett by acclamation. Up there they are going to make sure of keeping him in Congress, whether or not he wins the senatorial toga.

Red Cloud Republicans Nominate a Winning Ticket.

Following is the ticket nominated republican city convention at the yesterday:

For Mayor—E. W. Ross.
For City Clerk—L. H. Fort.
For City Treasurer—J. O. Butler.
For Police Judge—J. S. White.
For Councilman, First ward—W. R. Parker.
For Councilman, Second ward—C. F. Cather.
For Councilman, Second ward, to fill vacancy—George J. Warren.
For Members of School Board—V. B. Fulton and T. E. Penman.

The delegates to the republican city convention met in the court house yesterday afternoon at 2:30. The convention was called to order by D. W. Turnure, chairman of the city committee.

No more harmonious convention has ever been held in this city, and in our judgment an exceptionally strong ticket has been named, which will undoubtedly give to this city a business-like administration.

After the convention had been called to order, the credentials of the delegates were read and approved as follows:

First ward—L. H. Fort, W. N. Richardson, J. R. Mercer, Wm. Wolf, D. H. Groat, L. H. Rust, S. F. Spokesfield, Geo. Newhouse and W. R. Parker.
Second ward—C. W. Kaley, G. J. Warren, C. F. Cather, W. E. Rife, D. H. Kaley, E. W. Ross, E. S. Garber, J. S. White, H. J. Clark, L. E. Tait and J. W. Kinsel.

C. W. Kaley was chosen permanent chairman of the convention and H. J. Clark secretary.

A motion was then made and carried that the convention proceed to the nomination of candidates by ballot, the first ballot to be informal.

On the informal ballot for mayor, E. W. Ross, the present incumbent, received a majority of the votes cast, and upon motion of Mr. Cather the rules were suspended and Mr. Ross was declared the unanimous choice of the convention for mayor.

L. H. Fort was nominated for city clerk on the first ballot, and the balance of the ticket was chosen in like manner.

Three committeemen were chosen

from each ward. D. H. Kaley was chosen chairman of the city central committee, and George H. Overing secretary.

The city convention then adjourned and a mass convention of the school district was called to order, and V. B. Fulton and T. E. Penman were nominated for members of the school board.

Hand Caught in Buzz-Saw.

Wednesday afternoon Will Scrivner, the well known carpenter and contractor, had the misfortune to run his left hand against a buzz-saw, severing the first finger at the second joint and severely cutting the thumb and second finger. Dr. Damerell dressed the injured member, and it is hoped the injured thumb and second finger can be saved.

The Scrivners are certainly having more than their share of hard luck. Al Scrivner, a brother of Will, has just recently recovered from a severe attack of typhoid fever, and is not much more than able to be about.

Last week V. H. Scrivner, father of the boys, lost his new barn, which was but partly completed, as well as his old barn, cattle sheds, all his millet, alfalfa, prairie hay and a lot of corn, by fire. His little grandson had started a fire out in the road and, being unable to put it out, took it up on a shovel and carried it to the cow shed, as he said, "to put it in the shade, so it would cool quick." It didn't cool off quite quick enough.

We sincerely hope this third calamity will prove the climax of their troubles.

Jim Abel Dead.

Jim Abel, the popular clerk in Miner Bros.' dry goods department, who has been visiting in Hebron for the past two weeks, was taken seriously ill at the home of his brother-in-law, W. W. Wright, in that city last Friday. His condition became so alarming that his parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Abel, went to Hebron Wednesday morning, accompanied by Dr. Creighton. When they arrived there they found that he was suffering from an acute attack of appendicitis, and the only hope of saving his life lay in an operation. Dr. Creighton, assisted by two Hebron physicians, performed an operation Wednesday, but from the first there was little hope of his recovery, and death came at 6:10 last evening.

James Abel was about twenty-three years of age, and had been a resident of Red Cloud since a little child. He has been a clerk in Miner Bros.' dry goods department since 1898, and was one of the most popular young men in the city.

The body will arrive in Red Cloud this evening.

Assessment of Credits.

The ruling regarding the assessment of net credits applies to five items in the personal property schedule, as follows:

No. 3—All notes secured by mortgage owned by person listing property.

No. 4—All other notes owned.

No. 13—All book accounts due.

No. 15—All money loaned and not yet entered on the schedule.

No. 85—Credits not otherwise listed. Obligations owing of a similar nature may be deducted from these and from nothing else.

The taxpayer in making out his list of credits is required to take the following oath:

"I solemnly swear (or affirm) that the foregoing statement contains a true and correct list of bona fide debts by me owing for a consideration received, and that I am justly entitled to have the same deducted from the credits listed by me for taxation as shown for the year —, as provided by the revenue act passed in 1903"

Will Shouse Skips.

Will Shouse, who purchased Harry Sower's tailoring business in this city, is as left for parts unknown, leaving behind him a number of creditors who would like to know how and where they are going to get their money. Shouse organized a "pants" club and induced a number of people to join. Many of these people contributed their weekly quota to the pants fund and have nothing to show for it. It is said Shouse is about \$200 ahead of the game. C. T. Dickerson, with whom Shouse boarded, levied on the small stock of goods, etc., left by Shouse, and it is said the stuff was also covered by a mortgage.
