BARKER TRIAL POSTPONED

Judge Adams Grants a Continuance in the Case Until Thursday, May 5.

Frank Barker was brought into court Tuesday morning to hear his petition for continuance read. He does not seem to have lost any flesh and does not appear in the least worried over the ultimate outcome of the case against him.

The defense was represented in court Tuesday morning by Thos. H. Matters of Harvard, Neb., formerly law partner of J. R. Mercer, who had been called into the case owing to the illness of Mr. Mercer, counsel for the defense.

Attorney Matters presented a lengthy petition setting forth the reasons for asking for a continuance. The principal contention of the defense was that Barker had been haled into court on April 19, just six days prior to the sitting of the district court, and arraigned on the charge of having murdered his sister-in-law, Alice Barker, and that the time had not been long enough in which to allow defendant's attorneys to prepare their evidence. It was also alleged in the petition, and supported by medical certificates, that J. R. Mercer, leading counsel for defense, was ill and unable to do proper justice to his client. The defense asked for a continuance to the June term of the district court.

Judge Adams thought the attorneys for the defense had had sufficient time to prepare their case inasmuch as the evidence in the later charge would be exactly similar to that in the charge on which he was first arraigned, that of murdering his brother. Judge Adams expressed regret that the two charges had been joined, however, as it only served to complicate matters and gave an excuse for asking for a delay.

After brief arguments by attorneys on both sides Judge Adams finally excused the jury and continued the case until Thursday, May 5, at 9 a. m.

Death of Miss Gertrude Kaley.

Miss Gertrude Belle Kaley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Kaley of this city, died Sunday morning at 8:30, after an illness lasting over a year. Miss Kaley had been a sufferer from acute inflammatory rheumatism, and spent a few months in Colorado last year, returning home very much improved in health. She had been home but a short time, however, when she was again taken sick and was confined to her bed for the last three or four months.
