The old council met Tuesday evening and settled up the year's business. The new council and city officers were installed and adjournment was taken to Wednesday evening.

Wednesday evening the new council met in Firemen's hall, Mayor Ross in the chair. Present, Councilmen Parker, Cather and Warren.

The following committees were appointed: Auditing—Parker and Cather. Streets and alleys—First ward, Parker and Frame; Second ward, Cather and Warren.

Sup. lies—Cather. J. W. Kinsel was reappointed water commissioner and night watch at a salary of \$25 per month.

J. M. Sellars was reappointed engineer of the water works at \$40 per month. Clarence Lewis was appointed to ring the curfew bell, at a salary of 5 cents per night, or \$1.50 per month.

Bills allowed—Northwestern Coal and Mining Co., coal, \$27 82; J. W. Vest, labor, \$12 75; Will Vest, labor, \$3; Will Quedrick, labor, \$3.

The city clerk was instructed to draw a warrant each month for the telephone service at the water works.

The application of C. W. Bushee for a license to sell intoxicating liquors was withdrawn.

Applications of F. R. Mandeville and John Polnicky for licenses to sell intoxicating liquors were read.

Remonstrances against granting the above licenses, signed by H. W. Guilford, were read, and action was deferred to 8 o'clock last night to allow petitioners time to answer the remonstrances.

The mayor was authorized to notify users of city water to pay their water rentals to the city treasurer within ten days after notification of amount due. If same is not paid, water is to be cut off and a penalty of \$1 added when water is again turned on.
