A. Good being chosen as the nominee. Mr. Good being called made a short speech, dwelling principally on the revenue law passed at the last session of the legislature. Mr. Good's speech while not meant as such virtually amounted to praise for this law, he stated in substance that the law was drafted by the railroads and meant to assist the railroads in dodging their just share of taxation, but that in the working out it was falling heavier on the railroads and money loaners than on any one else. After listening to Mr. Good's speech the convention proceeded to the selection of delegates to the various conventions. W. B. Householder proposed the name of O. C. Teel for candidate for Secretary of State and moved that he be allowed to choose his own delegates to the state convention, which was done. Clarence Wilson was renominated as commissioner of the third district and F. H. Cooper of Guide Rock, was nominated from the fifth district after which convention adjourned.
