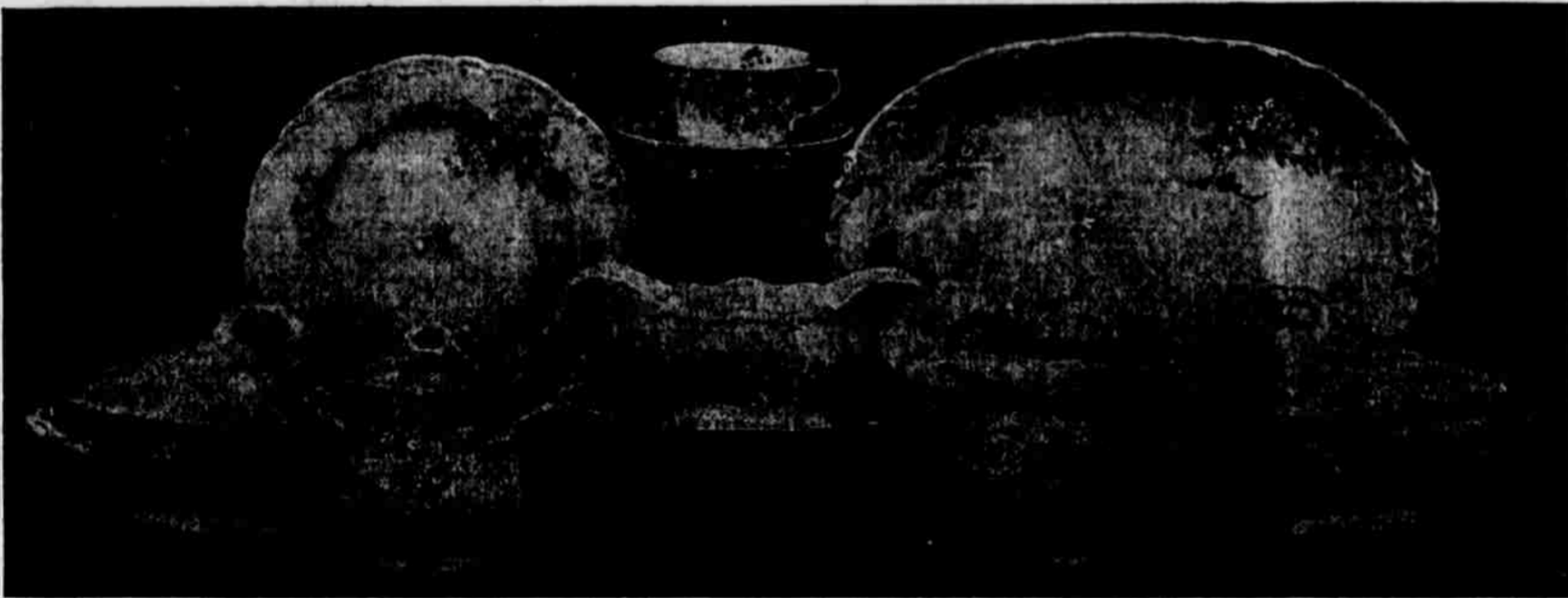

Commissioners Proceedings.
October 4, 1904
Board met in regular session with all members present.
In the matter of petition for and remonstrance against road on half section one in section 24 9, the same being north of Rosemont, petition was granted, provided petitioners pay, within ten days, the sum of \$200, in addition to the \$25 heretofore paid, on account of expenses incurred and the property owners are to have opportunity to remove crops, fences trees and other improvements. The following claims for damages on account of said road were allowed: A. E. Haas \$115; B. D. Hoppen \$50; I. Schermerhorn \$55.
Treasurer instructed sell lots 13 to 20, blk 9, Red Cloud addition to Red Cloud, for taxes, and costs of sale. In the matter of the double assessment of J. E. Earl, treasurer was instructed to strike from list.
Adjourned to October 5.
