Assessment of Fraternal Orders.

County Assessor Turner has issued the following notice to his deputies:
RED CLOUD, Neb. May 15, 1905.

Dear Sir:—It is my duty to advise you of the following action of the state board of equalization and assessment and has been approved by the attorney general, which is as follows:

That all property, money or credits, owned or controlled by mutual or fraternal insurance companies, societies or associations, clubs or lodges, except such as are expressly exempt by statute, shall be listed for taxation. You will govern yourself accordingly and see that the law is complied with according to the above ruling.

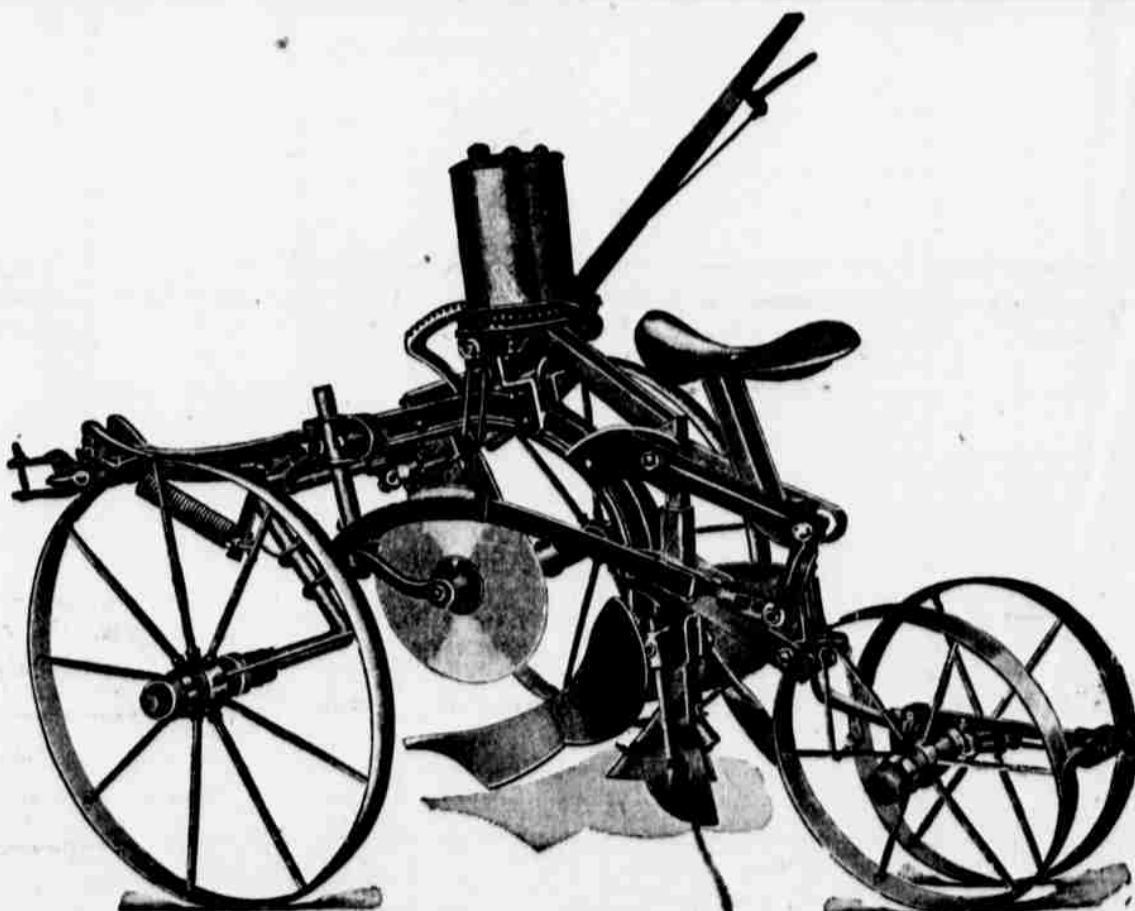
