### Webster County Republicans Nominate Complete Ticket Monday.

The Republicans of Webster county met in convention at the court house in this city at 11 a. m. Monday. There was not the least bit of wrangling and everything passed off harmoniously.

The convention was called to order by Charles F. Cather, chairman of the county committee. L. E. Tait acted as secretary.

Following the report of the committee on credentials the temporary organization was made permanent.

#### SUPERINTENDENT.

The first order of business was the nomination of a candidate for county superintendent.

On the informal ballot the vote was as follows: Mrs. Nellie Castor 98, Miss Stella Ducker 47, W. G. Shannon 9, Miss Ada Skjelver 2.

On the first formal ballot Mrs. Castor was nominated, receiving 105 votes, to 51 for Miss Ducker.

#### COUNTY JUDGE.

On the informal ballot for county judge A. H. Keeney received 115 votes, J. R. Mercer 22, Thornt Foe 17, Harrington 2.

On the first formal ballot Judge Keeney received 111 votes, Mercer 28, Foe 17. Judge Keeney was declared the nominee.

#### FOR SHERIFF

By the time the balloting for sheriff was reached the delegates had become warmed up and there being five candidates in the field, the contest was a warm one.

The informal ballot showed Hedge 42, Amack 27, Wolfe 17, McConkey 35, Colvin 34.

The first formal ballot gave Hedge 49, Amack 21, Wolfe 20, McConkey 30, Colvin 41.

Second ballot, Hedge 51, Amack 8, Wolfe 21, McConkey 34, Colvin 41.

Third ballot, Wolfe 10, Hedge 52, Amack 1, McConkey 32, Colvin 58, Scott 3.

Fourth ballot, Wolfe 10, Hedge 61, Amack 1, McConkey 23, Colvin 61.

On the fifth ballot Hedge received 84 votes and was declared the nominee. He was called to the platform and thanked the convention.

#### COUNTY CLERK.

The informal ballot for county clerk gave John Garber 57, V. B. Fulton 28, E. W. Ross 30, S. M. True 20, Walter Cox 11.

The first formal ballot showed considerable gain for Garber and on the second ballot he received the nomination, the vote being as follows: Garber 116, Fulton 8, Ross 23, True 9.

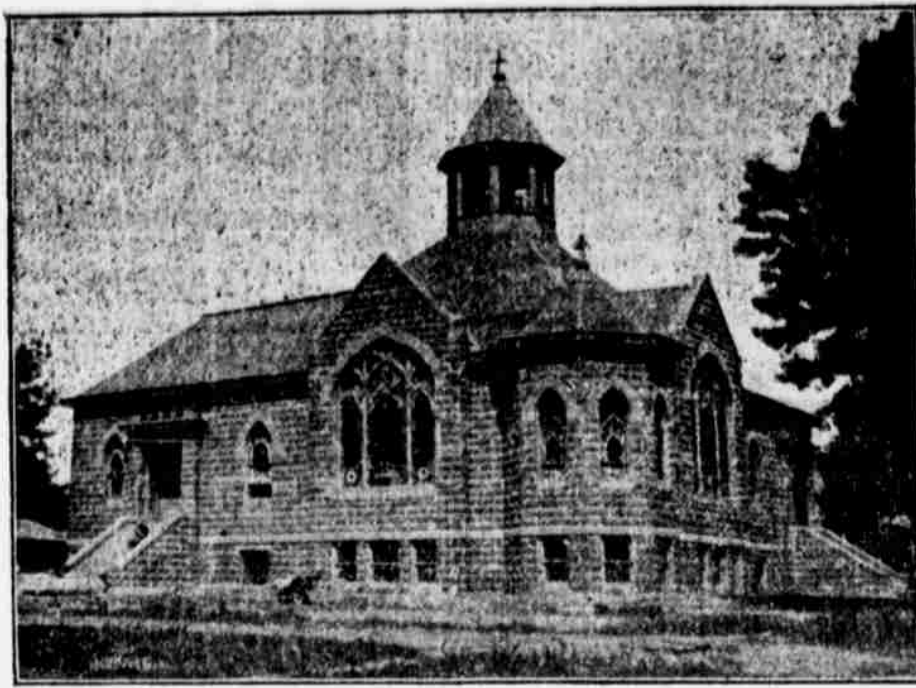
#### COUNTY TREASURER.

The two leading candidates for treasurer were W. C. Frahm of Blue Hill and W. H. Thomas of Red Cloud township. Mr. Frahm was nominated on the first formal ballot receiving 132 votes, the highest number cast for any candidate before the convention.

## The New M. E. Church.

To be Dedicated next Sunday, September 17.



On next Sunday, August 17th, will occur the dedication of the beautiful new Methodist Episcopal church erected in our city. This is an occasion which should engage the careful thought and consideration of every citizen of Red Cloud. About two years ago this enterprise was undertaken by the congregation of Methodist people of this city and in building the church they have endeavored not only to provide a suitable place of worship for their own congregation, but have erected a church which is an ornament to the city and will fill a long needed want of Red Cloud as a place for public gatherings of different kinds.

It has cost something over \$8000 to give to the public this church. At the present time the load is being carried by a few citizens who had the courage and public spirit to take hold of the matter, advance the funds and carry forward the enterprise, and it is now up to our people as citizens to determine whether or not the debt of this church shall be lifted and Red Cloud have free of debt this long needed, well furnished and commodious church.

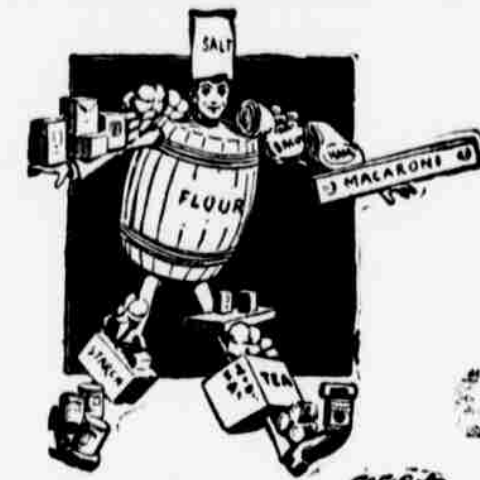

## Deaths and Funerals.

### Ernest Chambers.

One of the saddest deaths which it has been our duty to chronicle was that of Ernest Chambers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Chambers, who live near Blue Hill, which occurred Saturday afternoon at his home on the L. D. Thomas farm, near Cowles. Mr. Chambers had been sick for about a week with appendicitis, and it was decided that an operation was necessary. Saturday morning the operation was performed, but the shock was too much for his system and he died in the afternoon. A particularly sad feature of the death was the fact that his wife, to whom he had been married only a little over a year, was lying ill in the same house, she having given birth to a son but a week previous. Funeral services were held at the home Sunday afternoon, conducted by Rev. G. W. Hummell and Rev. Hutchins, and interment was in the Cowles cemetery.

Deceased was born near Blue Hill twenty-four years ago, and is survived by his wife and child, father and mother, sister and two half brothers. He was a nephew of S. J. Chambers, who built the M. E. church here, and was also a cousin of Dr. E. A. Thomas.

### A. J. Means.

The funeral of Andrew J. Means, who died last Friday morning, was held Sunday afternoon at 2:30, from the Congregational church, Rev. G. H.

Rice conducting the services. The funeral was in charge of the Odd Fellows, and there were delegations from Franklin and Guide Rock present. The remains were laid to rest in the Indian creek cemetery.

A J. Means was born in Ohio, November 19, 1833. He removed to Michigan with his parents when but three years of age, and lived there until he was 21. In 1862 he enlisted in a Michigan regiment of volunteers, serving two and a half years. He was twice married, being the father of three sons and two daughters by the first marriage and two sons and one daughter by his second marriage, his second wife dying in 1894. Mr. Means was one of the pioneers of Webster county, having come here in the fall of 1874.
