



One of the saddest deaths which it has been our duty to chronicle was that of Ernest Chambers, son of Mr. and Mrs Thomas Chambers, who live near Blue Hill, which occurred Saturday afternoon at his home on the L. D. Thomas farm, near Cowles. Mr. Chambers had been sick for about a week with appendicitis, and it was decided that an operation was necessary. Saturday morning the operation was performed, but the shock was too much for his system and he died in the afternoon. A particularly sad feature of the death was the fact that his wife, to whom he had been married only a little over a year, was lying ill in the same house, she having given birth to a son but a week previous. Funeral services were held at the home Sunday afternoon, conducted by Rev. G. W. Hummell and Rev. Hutchins, and interment was in the

Cowles cemetery. Deceased was born near Blue Hill twenty four years ago, and is survived by his wife and child, father and mother, sister and two half brothers. He was a nephew of S. J. Chambers, who built the M. E. church here, and was also a cousin of Dr. E A. Thomas.
