The Lincoln Evening News has the following very interesting item con cerning the the exhibit of yellow ochre from the mine near Blue Hill:

"For the first time in the history of the fair a mineral exhibit of a Nebraska product is to be seen. In the Webster county exhibit is a little table upon which are displayed a number of samples of crude ochre from a mine located on C. Rose's farm, eight miles southeast of Blue Hill. Ochre is a pigment that is used in all paints that one sees in tin pails at the stores. Two thirds of the amount consumed in the United States is imported, mostly from France and Italy, and the | 25 to 30. company of Webster county capitalists that has been organized to develop this mine believe they have a big thing ahead.
