In the reading room of the British museum desks are crowded with stu-
dents all day long, and in addition to dents all day long, and in addition to
the books of reference, some 20,000
in number, in number, which fill the open shelves of the room, from three to four thou-
sand volumes are given out every day. Theology in a wide sense, Including the Bible, Biblical literature, church his-
tory and works on the religious rites and ceremonies of all races and creeds, is easily at the head of the list, with
about 300 volumes. Toporaphy comes next, with abouts twenty fewer, and of
these books on London amount to a guarter, books on Engllsh topography
to another quarter, the other to another quarter, the other half be-
ing for the rest of the world. History and blography come next, Eng-
lish history belng mostly in demand, and books on France and the French
provinces second. Essays, criticlsm provinces second. Essays, criticlsm
and miscellaneous interature talke the fourth place and are followed by ficmoral phllosophy, poetry and the fine arts, the drama, law and phllology,
political economy and so on down to polltics, mathematics and chemistry,
which have about forty volumes apiece,
and, lastly, works on naval and, lasty, works on naval and mill-
tary subjects, whtch seldom have more
than thre or four volumes each. It

light on the sort of studlies taken up
by the readers in the museum. - London
