Following this a resolution was adopted stating it to be the sense of the meeting that if the investigation should show the plan to be feasible, the mayor should call a special election to vote bonds in the sum of \$10,000 for the purpose of installing an electric light plant in connection with the water plant, and the meeting adjourned.

If the people of Red Cloud want to improve the water plant and establish an electric light works, they should show it by taking more interest in the matter and helping the council decide what should be done.
