Mr. and Mrs. Kudrna visited at J. W. McCoy's Sunday.


Granma Stobb is visiting at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Baker.

## LIVE STOCK MARKETS AT KANSAS CITY.

KANSAS CITY, October 31—Receipts of cattle thus far this week are 31,000; last week, 45,300; last year, 34,800. Monday's supply of beef steers was moderate, but trade was slow, although generally steady rates prevailed. Cows were mostly 10 cents higher. Stockers and feeders were active and steady to strong. Today's run of beef steers was light and trading active at steady to 10 cents higher figures. Cows and heifers were strong to 10 cents higher. Bulls were slow but steady; veals scarce and firm. Best stockers and feeders were steady to 10 cents higher; others unchanged.

Receipts of hogs thus far this week are 21,300; last week, 22,300; last year, 22,000. Monday's market was generally 5 cents higher but closed weak and today generally 5 cents lower rates prevailed with bulk of sales from \$4.90 to 5.00; top \$5.07 1/2.

Receipts of sheep thus far this week are 8,400; last week, 6,100; last year, 18,300. Monday's market was steady and today lambs were steady but strong to 10 cents higher. We quote—choice lambs \$7.50 to 7.65; choice yearlings, \$5.75 to 6.00; choice wethers, \$5.50 to 5.75; choice ewes, \$5.25 to 5.35.
