KANSAS CITY, July 3.—For the week ending Saturday killing steers gained 15 to 30 cents; cows and heifers of best kinds 15 to 25 cents, canners unchanged. Stockers and feeders advanced 10 to 15 cents, making them 25 to 40 cents above low points two weeks ago. Veals broke fully 50 cents. Receipts Monday were 12,500. The market was strong to 10 cents higher on choice of ferings; others weak to 10 cents lower. Receipts today were 9,000; market strong.

Hog prices gained 25 cents for the week ending last Saturday. Receipts Monday were 7,500, market steady; receipts Tuesday 14,000 market opened strong to 5 cents higher, closing weak; bulk of sales \$6.60 to 6.67<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>; top \$6.70.

Best sheep and lambs held about steady for the week ending last Saturday, others declining 15 to 25 cents. Receipts Monday were 9,500; market unevenly lower; receipts today were 6,000, market steady.

A WONDER OF JAPAN.

The Famous Castle of the Gold Dolphins at Nishima.

Is the novel castle at Nishima, Japan, the palace which Marco Polo described in his tale of the marvels of far Cathay as covered with gold slabs? At the ends of the ridge of the pyramidal structure are large solid gold dolphins. Beneath the pile is a well which is literally a salted gold mine. It is gold lined and will hold sufficient water to supply 5,000 persons. The dolphins, which were placed on the top several centuries ago, have excited the curiosity of foreign relic hunters, as any one might imagine they would. So many have climbed to the top of the high structure to discover by testing if they are real gold that the dolphins have become seriously disfigured. Strong steel wire bags have been put over them to prevent further vandalism.

Only by good fortune does one of these dolphins still grace the old castle. A number of years ago it was taken down and sent to Vienna for exhibition at the world's fair held there as a rare specimen of ancient Japanese art. The vessel on which it was being returned sank, and it lay at the bottom of the sea for several years in spite of every attempt to raise it. Persistence was rewarded at last, for it was finally recovered and placed again in its old position.

The castle is used by the emperor of Japan as his headquarters during the army and navy reviews. State balls are also held there.—Chicago Inter Ocean.

London's Last Public Hanging.

The grewsome spectacle of a public execution in England is happily a thing of the past. The scaffold used to be erected in the roadway outside the prison, and crowds would assemble to witness the sight, the last time a man was hanged in public being when Michael Barrett suffered the extreme penalty in May, 1868, in Old Bailey, outside Newgate prison, for exploding a cask of gunpowder under the walls of Clerkenwell prison to release the Fenian prisoners Burke and Casey, a mad act that killed several and injured still more.—London Graphic.

Hope for Change in Orders.

Valentine, Neb., July 2.—Much interest is taken among the officers and others at Fort Niobrara over the newspaper reports that Governor Lanham of Texas has submitted a petition to the president asking that the Twenty-fifth Infantry be not ordered to Texas. Members of the regiment who have been stationed with the colored troops in Texas realize the feeling that exists against them in that state.
