### Wants His Money Back.

Joshua Rushton, from over near Esbon, has begun suit in the district court for the recovery of \$1,450 from A. H. Carpenter and parties in Imperial. It appears that some time ago the Imperial parties sold a quarter section of land to Mr. Rushton for \$400, \$1450 cash and the balance to be paid January 20, at which time the deeds were to be delivered. Mr. Rushton was not satisfied with the title to the land, and sent an attorney to Imperial to investigate. When the attorney tendered the balance of the purchase money to the Imperial parties they were unable to give a clear title to the property, so Mr. Rushton has sued for the recovery of his first payment. Mr. Carpenter was made a party to the suit, he having acted as agent in the sale of the land.
